

THE UFO EXPERIENCE by J. Allen Hynek (1972, 270 pages)

- 17 In this classic introduction to the subject of UFOs, Dr. Hynek indicates the overwhelming volume of evidence which serves as the raw data for a scientific examination of the subject, states his criteria for evaluating the evidence, and explains his system of classifying UFO reports. He gives examples of each type, as well as examples of misidentifications of known phenomena. He discusses his experience as astronomy consultant to the Air Force's "Project Blue Book," the unwarranted conclusions of the Condon Committee's investigation, and general and scientific attitudes on this subject.

THE HYNEK UFO REPORT, by J. Allen Hynek (1977, 299 pages)

- 18 As consultant to the USAF Project "Blue Book" for 20 years, Dr. Hynek viewed the Air Force effort to collect, and supposedly to study, UFO reports from the inside. In this book he outlines many of the sighting reports that came through that office and demonstrates the Air Force attempt to disparage the witnesses and the phenomenon following the recommendations of the CIA's Robertson panel in 1953. He concludes with an evaluation of the Condon Committee's investigations, conclusions and report.

THE EDGE OF REALITY by J. Allen Hynek and Jacques Vallee (1976, 301 pages)

Hynek and Vallee hypothesize about the nature of UFOs and present some ideas of scientists currently considering the problem. Several case studies are presented in detail, though most of the book is conversational, the approach the authors used in their collaboration. The global nature of UFO reports and the attitude of the U.S. Air Force are also discussed.

THE UFO CONTROVERSY IN AMERICA, by David M. Jacobs (1975, 362 pages)

- 20 Based on a doctoral dissertation, this definitive work details the controversy from 1896 through 1973, using previously unavailable U.S. Air Force documents and a wealth of published and unpublished materials. It is excellent, and basic to understanding recent public history of UFOs.

This is Battelle Memorial Institute's analysis of UFO reports, undertaken to determine if the details of sighting reports that were later identifiable in terms of known objects were different in any significant way from those that remained unexplained. The conclusion depends upon the interpretation. The report describes 12 sightings that were analyzed in some detail in order to determine if there were such a thing as a "model UFO" and concludes there was not. Many tables and charts are included.

Omitted from this reproduction is Appendix A, 147 pages of detailed tables and Appendix B, 65 pages of working paper forms, although an 11-page index of the Appendix and several sample pages of the tables are included.

REPORT OF MEETINGS OF SCIENTIFIC ADVISORY PANEL ON UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS CONVENED BY OFFICE OF SCIENTIFIC INTELLIGENCE, CIA (1953, 42 pages) [Robertson Report]

The report of these meetings, called by the CIA, established the government attitude toward the subject of UFOs, based on the material furnished the panel by the U.S. Air Force. Included herein is a brief history of this report written by Ann Druffel, who was instrumental in bringing about the declassification of this report by the CIA.

SPECIAL REPORT OF THE USAF SCIENTIFIC ADVISORY BOARD AD HOC COMMITTEE TO REVIEW PROJECT "BLUE BOOK" (1966, 15 pages) [O'Brien Report]

This report was prepared prior to the hearings of the Armed Services Committee Investigating UFOs, and became a part of those hearings. Among the recommendations was the negotiation of university contracts to provide scientific investigation of selected sightings, and the designation of AFSC base personnel to work with such investigators.
