Dear Dr. Millman:

Referring to your letter of April 25th, file M45-1-101 dealing with my letter of April 19th to Mr. L. Cadieux.

It would appear that I am bothering you with the same questions however I am certain that you can see from the content of my letter to Mr. Cadieux that I was endeavouring to obtain information relative to their investigations. I think it would be best if we were to visit the National Research Council rather than be involved in a merry-go-round of correspondence between the Defence Department and the N.R.C. I am writing to one of our members in Ottawa - Mr. Arthur Bray - asking him to contact you in this connection.

We had hoped that the transfer of UFO investigations from the government to the National Research Council would result in a full-scale scientific look at the phenomenon however this apparently is not the case and this is not a criticism of the N.R.C. or anyone connected with it. I fully realize that you are spending public funds however it seems to me that the UFO puzzle is worthy of an extensive scientific approach even if there is the remotest possibility that life from other planets are, in fact, visiting us. You simply cannot overlook the evidence that allows us to speculate in this direction. May I recommend the books by Aime Michel or Jacques Vallee, a mathematician and astronomer respectively, who have compiled a formidable amount of material on this subject and who both agree that the scientific world should come to grips the phenomenon rather than the bitter pro and con argument that now exists.
