I should appreciate it very much if you will please answer the following questions for me:

1. Did three F.B.I. agents visit Mr. George Adamski and threaten him that he was to keep quiet and not to mention the government or any of its services hereafter?
2. Was Mr. Adamski warned that because of the broadcast a warrant for his arrest had been signed by the Attorney-General and that the next time a thing like this occurred he would be arrested?
3. How did Mr. Adamski violate the law? (b)(7)(c)

I received a letter dated July 25, 1956, from [redacted] Trade Practice Consultant, of the Better Business Bureau of Los Angeles. The letter reads as follows:

"We regret our inability to give you the answers to the three questions you propound in your letter of July 20.

First, there are 25 radio stations in operation in Los Angeles. We do not attempt to monitor or acquire records of each and every program which these various stations carry. The only avenue for checking such a matter would be to cause someone to go to each station and review their logs of every program they respectively sponsored on December 17, 1953. Unfortunately this Bureau has no staff of investigators which do that type of work, and we certainly could not spare our normal operating personnel in performing such an endless and questionable task.

You ask us whether three FBI agents visited George Adamski and threatened him. While we doubt that such a thing ever happened, we certainly would have no means of knowing it.

You ask us further whether Mr. Adamski was given a warning or threat of a warrant or arrest because of his purported broadcast. Again, how would we know that unless Mr. Adamski stated it to be a fact?

Next you ask us whether Mr. Adamski violated the law. In turn, we must ask, violating the law doing what? Further, you are asking this Bureau a question of law, and under no circumstances do we or could we, with propriety, answer legal inquiries.

You mention the Attorney-General. We assume you refer to the United States Attorney-General. It would occur to us that if he or any of his subordinates United States District Attorneys caused a warrant of any type
