- 30 An attempt to approach systematically the information, fact, and lore of the UFO phenomenon, including a chronological list of 100 UFO sightings (from 1500 B.C. to 1978), a list of UFO organizations and contactee groups, and of UFO periodicals over the world. The 500 entries discuss sightings, photos, witnesses, abductions, "ancient astronaut" lore, and celebrity witnesses who have reported UFOs. A serious, though highly individual, effort.

THE KAIKOURA UFOs, by Capt Bill Startup with Neil Illingworth (1980, 209pp)

- 32 When two experienced New Zealand pilots saw strange lighted objects around their plane on Dec. 21, 1978, other observers on the ground as well as ground and air radar recorded them also. Ten days later, a television crew, flying the same route for background shots, saw and photographed more and equally strange moving lights several times. The pilot of the second plane presents a carefully detailed account of those sightings, of some of the thorough analysis of those photos, and of diverse reactions to those events.

- 33 A comprehensive, illustrated, reference work covering UFO sightings, people involved in UFO-related activities (with photos and position statements), aspects of UFO encounters, and theories of UFO origins. Written with an obvious desire to be as objective and factual as possible, the book provides an invaluable background of lore and information to anyone interested in the UFO phenomenon, for whom it is hard to put down.

- 34 With a brief recap of the history of UFO sightings and a discussion of the problems of elusive data and difficulties of research on UFOs, the authors present the "Ten Best UFO Sightings" in some detail, followed by several representative theories of UFO origin. There is a surprising foreword by Thornton Page and an interesting appendix on the limits of science by Bruce Murray.
