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The Robert Kennedy UFO Story



Thanks to the efforts of History Channel and John Greenwald a clear picture of the UFO beliefs of Robert Kennedy has finally emerged. Robert, who was the Attorney General in his brother's administration, has often been written up in UFO lore as being a key student of ufology.

Over the years letters related to UFOs have circulated with purported Kennedy signatures. The letters claimed that Kennedy had anything from a slight interest in the subject, to one letter where Kennedy supposedly stated that he was a card-carrying member of the Amalgamated Flying Saucers Association.

In the summer of 2005 John Greenwald, the webmaster of www.blackvault.com (a web site that specializes in government documents connected to the UFO subject), visited the Kennedy presidential library and returned to his home in California with over two dozen Kennedy UFO letters.

These letters, recovered mostly from the Kennedy Outer Space files, do indeed show an interest by Robert Kennedy in the UFO story as it was being portrayed in the media in the mid 1960s. "I am keeping myself abreast of information developed on this subject."^[1] Without exception, however, the Kennedy letters show a man who has concluded there is no cover-up and UFOs are not

extraterrestrial.

Most of the letters were answered with a couple different form letters with small variations. In many cases Kennedy handwrites part or in one case the entire reply. This is very usual as most high-ranking government officials used secretaries or assistants to answer mail – especially UFO mail.

In many of the letters Kennedy quoted astronomer Dr. Harlow Shapley at the Harvard Observatory that “there is a high probability that there must be other beings in the universe.” However, Kennedy made it clear that he did not believe that that ET life had arrived on earth.

“From the evidence to date,” Kennedy told many letter writers, “I do not believe that UFO phenomena are caused by vehicles of extraterrestrial origin.”^[ii] Furthermore, Kennedy agreed with the material the Air Force was putting out on UFOs, “I have looked into the matter and do not believe that the Air Force is censoring any information of interest to the public of so-called ‘Unidentified flying objects.’”^[iii]

Some writers pushed Kennedy to back a congressional hearing into the accumulated UFO evidence. Kennedy agreed that if needed the hearing should be open to the public. “If it were desirable to hold congressional hearings on the question of unidentified flying objects, I would certainly agree that they should be open to the public.”^[iv]

Kennedy however, was skeptical of the need for any such congressional actions. “Based on the information available to me from NASA and the Air Force, I do not believe that Congressional hearings on this subject would serve a useful purpose at this time.”^[v]

Dear Mr. Kennedy,
I have received your July 15 letter concerning the unidentified flying object phenomena, for which I thank you.

You stated that, from the evidence available to date, you do not believe that UFO phenomena are caused by vehicles of extraterrestrial origin.

The truth is, that there is not enough evidence made public by the U.S. Air Force. The Air Force is censoring all important UFO information. I know that is an old story, but the organization of which I am a member, the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena (NICAP), has collected a great deal of evidence proving Air Force censorship. Late in 1964, NICAP compiled a 186-page, 200,000 word, illustrated report, which was submitted to Congress ("UFO EVIDENCE"). I am happy to report that the document, which contains many authenticated sightings, has brought response from many Congressmen and Senators. The overall response is one of surprise, and most of the Congressmen have promised their support in UFO hearings.

Allow me to site a very recent example of Air Force cover-ups. Vice President Humphrey wrote to the Air Force on behalf of a U.S. citizen, and requested to know how many UFO sightings remain unidentified in AF files. He promptly received a letter with the answer. He (Mr. Humphrey) immediately passed the letter on to the citizen, quite unaware that the answer was untrue! The letter Mr. Humphrey received from the AF Congressional Inquiry Division was that all sightings had been identified. But, at this very same time, the Air Force had released its annual Project Bluebook report, which stated that 663 sightings are still unidentified! To mislead the Vice President seems unwise.

I have a copy of an Air Force document which has recently been classified. This document, Air Force Regulation 200-2, is the official order for reporting UFO sightings. Why is this document classified? Because NICAP, in a recent issue of its "UFO Investigator," sited the contradictions between AFR 200-2 and official Air Force censorship denials! I have checked my copy of AFR 200-2 and have found that it does indeed contain these con-

tradictions.

NICAP has over 5000 members in all 50 states and 30 foreign countries. It has operated since 1956, carrying on an honest investigations into the UFO phenomena---and Air Force censorship.

NICAP's clear record has gained the trust of military men and scientists all over the world. UFO reports are investigated by trained persons with open minds. NICAP discards almost half of the reports it receives, due to flaws which make the report sketchy in information, or because the reports are obviously from crackpots who have overactive imaginations or desires for publicity.

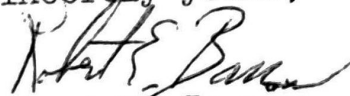
NICAP's main offices are located in Washington, D.C., at 1536 Connecticut Avenue, N.W. You may, if you wish, examine our files, which are full of documented information.

In the meantime, I hope to obtain our "UFO EVIDENCE" report for you, and possibly some other material. I had intended to write a much shorter letter, but I wanted to point out certain facts which, I believe, you should know.

One thing is true about ~~the~~ UFO subject: The USAF is censoring all important information on the subject. Air Force men can receive strict punishment for discussing UFO reports in public. For a start, I suggest that you obtain AFR 200-2. When you receive it, please let me know.

Dear Senator Kennedy:

In your recent referral to the Department of Defense you requested a report in behalf of Mr. Charles J. Quagliana relative to unidentified flying objects (UFO's).

The Air Force does not withhold or censor any information on UFO's. The investigations have always been made available to bona fide news representatives and scientific researchers. Press releases are issued as warranted, and an annual report on the project is available to the public. A copy of this report is attached for your information.

In 18 years of investigating over 9,000 reports of UFO's, the evidence has proved almost conclusively that reported aerial phenomena have been objects either created and sent aloft by man, generated by atmospheric conditions, or caused by celestial bodies or the residue of meteoric activity.

The Air Force has lost one aircraft and pilot in connection with a UFO incident. Captain Mantell was asked to identify a UFO while on an aircraft ferrying mission in 1952 over Godman Field in Kentucky. Because his aircraft was not outfitted with the necessary oxygen equipment for a high altitude flight, Captain Mantell died of oxygen starvation while attempting to identify the object, and his aircraft consequently crashed. A copy of the Air Force evaluation of this case is also attached for your further information.

Another incident which is often mistakenly identified as a UFO case involved an F-89 aircraft which was scrambled to intercept an unidentified aircraft which was successfully accomplished and identified as a Dakota (Canadian C-47). It is presumed by the Air Force that the pilot suffered vertigo while returning to his base and crashed into Lake Michigan. This case is carried in Air Force aircraft accident records (see attached resume).

We are pleased to be of service in providing you this report.

Dear Senator Kennedy:

This is in reply to your inquiry in behalf of Mr. Raymond G. Konley regarding unidentified flying objects (UFOs).

Literature about UFOs written by Captain Ruppelt, Major Keyhoe and Mr. Edwards is not reviewed, indorsed, sponsored, or sanctioned in any way by the Air Force.

Air Force Regulation 200-2, Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs), (which has been superseded by Air Force Regulation 80-17, Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs)) did not order the "shooting down of a UFO." It reads, in part, as follows: "The UFO Program provides for the prompt reporting and rapid identification needed for successful 'identification,' which is the second of the four phases of air defense -- detection, identification, interception, and destruction." Apparently the sentence has been misconstrued and the word "destruction" has been translated to "shoot down" UFOs. However, we point out that the UFO program provides only for the "identification" aspect of air defense.

Inclosed is a copy of the news release of October 7, 1966 regarding the selection of the University of Colorado to conduct independent investigations of UFO reports. The investigating team will be permitted to release and publish its findings.

Contrary to Mr. Konley's belief, the Air Force has never attempted to cover up UFO information. The possible existence of extraterrestrial life within the universe

has never been denied; however, the Air Force has no tangible proof that there is extraterrestrial life nor do we have any proof that UFOs are interplanetary space vehicles.

A letter similar to this one is being sent to the Honorable William Proxmire, United States Senate, in response to his inquiry.

It is a pleasure to be of service in clarifying the Air Force position regarding UFOs.
