Dear Sir:

The item in "BELOW THE HILL" on March 17th, about flying saucers or UFOs, challenges me to set the record straight.

The fact that Sir Bernard Lovell does not believe in UFOs is not bad news for "flying saucer buffs" as his views have been well known for many years. Despite Sir Bernard's reputation as an astronomer, his opinion on UFOs is refuted by many other scientists, some of whom are equally well known. Being an expert in astronomy does not necessarily make him an expert on UFOs, as the study of UFOs is not limited to the field of astronomy by any means.

I submitted a brief to the Senate Special Committee on Science Policy, titled "Science, Society and the UFO" (Proceedings, App. 212) a copy of which I forwarded to your paper a day or two ago, (addressed directly to Dr. John Grace). In this brief, I name and quote several top scientists who do believe in UFOs and are very concerned about them.

A great many people around the world are seriously concerned about these strange objects in our skies, as they do indeed exist, as my brief clearly shows. What they are is another matter, but that is the question which requires an answer.

Far too frequently we see a news report on the subject of UFOs which suggests that such things do not exist, and implies they are a figment of people's imagination, but without the whole story, all the facts, being told. My brief presents a broad and comprehensive view of the UFO problem, and if this is studied I think it will shed considerable light on the matter for those who may not be well informed on the subject.
