Dear Sir:

I was surprised to see the two pages of cartoons about UFOs in your Winter 67-68 issue. I was surprised because of the subtle point to them, as most scientists are sceptical about UFOs and won't even investigate them (which, of course, is most unscientific).

As a researcher in this field for twenty years, and a layman as far as science is concerned (but nevertheless extremely interested in the ways of science and scientists) I have found that science has been very remiss in many ways in so far as investigation of UFOs is concerned. Your readers may be interested in the fact that I am the author of the first book in Canada on the subject of UFO investigation. Titled Science, the Public and the UFO, it is a philosophical study of the scientific approach to such investigations and it sheds light on why investigations have revealed little or nothing of the true nature of UFO phenomena to date. Published in December, 1967, the book is available only directly from Bray Book Service, P.O. Box 5051, Station F, Ottawa, at \$5.75 cloth, and \$2.90 paperback.

Although I am a serving naval officer by profession, this fact bears no relation to my study, or writing of my book.
