

out, the results of these studies as well as the answers to my other questions in my letter of 10 January.

I am fully aware of NRC's activity since 1968 (at least that which is available to the public) through visits to its offices as Dr. McNamara points out but the information available from NRC in no way answers my questions. I do know that the answers are available somewhere within the Government, and it is Information Canada's job to find them.

For your own information, you may not be aware that despite NRC's supposed interest, they do not investigate UFOs. If an aerial object can be identified as a meteor, then NRC is interested. If it was clearly not a meteor, the report is simply filed in their "Non-meteoritic Sighting File". Therefore the remaining sightings are not investigated, as NRC admits. It is these unidentified objects in which I, and many thousands of other Canadians are interested, yet NRC clearly is not, unless this is all a cover-up of secret information which it may very well be.

I wish it to be clearly understood that I am very serious about this matter and am engaged in research in the public interest because the government has consistently failed to do adequate and thorough research itself, or if it has done it, it has failed to make it public.

I am aware of two or three studies of UFOs conducted by the Canadian Government but I have no way at present of knowing whether I am aware of all of them unless the government itself tells me about them. For example, the Hon. Paul Hellyer, while Defence Minister, announced (Ottawa Journal, 20 July, 1967) that the government had made available the DNB experimental station at Suffield, Alberta as a landing site for UFOs thirteen years previously, but that nothing ever materialized from that project. The full details of this project should be made public. If still top secret, the reasons for such secrecy should be made known.

Over the years, I have written to various government departments and to the Prime Minister himself seeking various answers but the replies have always come from only one department or another at any given time, such as in the present instance of NRC which as you can see is quite unsatisfactory. Information Canada is supposedly in business to overcome this very difficulty but is not doing its job.
