Dear Mr. Chairman:

It was gratifying to learn of the affirmation by the National Security Council, through Major General Robert L. Schweitzer's response of November 21, 1981, to our associate Major Colman S. Von Keviczky, acknowledging the Major's two Memorandums sent to President Ronald Reagan. In his letter General Schweitzer stated that the President "is well aware of the threat" posed by UFOs which Major VonKeviczky has been able to "document so clearly." (Please see the enclosed January 1982 PPCC Bulletin for reference.)

As you and the Council well know, the UFO problem has continued unabated for several decades and presents the gravest threat not only to the security of the United States but also to all nations of Earth who look to our Nation and our President for leadership and guidance in these critical times. Therefore, the heavy responsibility for the burden of security should not be carried by our Government alone. Your reference (communicated in General Schweitzer's above-cited response) "to restore the national defense margin of safety" should be extended to include all nations friendly to us who unanimously offered their complete cooperation to Major VonKeviczky's proposal for a joint UFO effort, if the USA would at long last grasp the historic initiative toward the solution of this acute global-security problem. This overwhelmingly positive reaction by many Nations resulted from the Major's address to the British House of Lords UFO Select Committee and his European tour in 1980, culminating in the Memorandums and letter addressed to President Reagan.

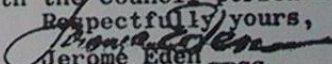
The UFO problem offers us a singular alternative to a Third World War: the possibility of relieving international tensions by focusing attention upon cooperative efforts to come to grips with these outer-space intruders, as General Douglas MacArthur first suggested. Clearly, our Nation must take the first bold international step in this direction or lose the initiative by default.

To this end, Major VonKeviczky and I respectfully request a personal conference with you and members of the Council to explore the possibilities for taking concrete steps in launching a Global UFO Security Congress under the aegis of the United States. Such a momentous step would be in complete harmony with President Reagan's courageous concern for world peace and security, opening new vistas of international cooperation on an urgent problem far exceeding national and political interests. As you well know, Sir, the issue is the survival of the human race itself!

Our Committee is presently involved in research dealing with the development of a defensive technology against these space intruders which we are most eager to discuss with the Council personally.
