riot act in no uncertain terms pointing out he has used this document in a fraudulent, improper manner, that this Bureau has not endorsed, approved, or cleared his speeches or book, that he knows it, and the Bureau will simply not tolerate any further foolishness, misrepresentations, and falsity on his part. Willis was told to instruct the Agents to diplomatically relieve, if possible, the document in issue from Adamski. Willis said he would do this and send in a report at once.

Lieutenant [redacted] Air Force Staff (Code 131; Ext. 75131) in the Pentagon advised [redacted] at 5:00 P.M., 12-15-53, that he has the responsibility for answering all complaints, etc., on flying saucers. He serves in the capacity of a press officer for the Air Force. He said the Air Force has received a letter from the above-named [redacted] of the Better Business Bureau which [redacted] determined is identical to that received by the Director concerning the alleged clearance by the FBI and Air Force of Adamski's material. Lieutenant [redacted] said the Air Force is considering replying to the letter to the effect the Air Force has not approved or cleared Adamski's endeavors, does not approve of them, that Adamski's writings and unverified expressions of opinion are causing confusion in the public mind, and that someone, possibly the Better Business Bureau, should definitely label Adamski and his works for the fraud they are known to be. [redacted] told [redacted] that any action he took, of course, would be agreeable to the Bureau and that the FBI intended to again interview Adamski concerning his latest escape.

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
