Dallas Will Salute Armed Forces Day

In a world heavy with tension and strife, Dallas Saturday will salute its armed forces—sentinels of the free nations—on the fifth Armed Forces Day.

The chances of the free world's survival, an admiral said here Friday, depend on how well it can wage the battle of minds as well as the battle of guns.

Vice-Admiral James L. Holloway Jr., former Dallas resident and chief of naval personnel, who will review the Armed Forces Day parade Saturday morning, asserted Friday the West's need for power.

Speaking at a Baker Hotel luncheon given by the Dallas Chamber of Commerce military affairs committee and the Lions Club, Admiral Holloway said "As the economic and military sponsor backing the freedom-loving nations of the world, we must maintain 'pax Americana' with patience,

vigilance and confident fortitude."

To be effective in world leadership, he said, the United States must apply its influence from a position of power. And the main-spring of power, he added, is the enterprise, loyalty and patriotic drive of the American people.

Admiral Holloway noted that H-bomb can be met with H-bomb, but it requires a stronger weapon—fundamental truth and an abiding comprehension of American concepts of liberty—to withstand the boring within men's minds.

Saturday's parade, which he will lead along with Chamber President Jerome K. Crossman and Col. T. J. Moroney, chairman of the military affairs committee, will assemble at 10:30 a.m. at the Triple Underpass. It will start up Main Street at 10:45 a.m.

After passing city hall, where the reviewing stand will be set up, the parade will break up.

The color guard will be composed of Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force men.

Bands will be from the American Legion, the 49th Division, the Texas Air National Guard and the high schools' ROTC.

The parade will feature the University of Texas' Ranger drill team with its sweetheart, Miss Patti Jones; the Dallas Naval Air Station drill team, the Sam Houston rifles from Arlington State College, Southern Methodist University's Air Force ROTC and high school ROTC units; Army, Air Force and Marine reserve units.

Tanks and tank destroyers of the 49th Division will rumble down Main Street, and airplanes of the Air Force, Texas Air National Guard, Marine Air Detachment and Civil Air Patrol will fly overhead.

Other officers in the reviewing stand will include Col. David West-staff Jr., Air Force; Capt. W. N. Wylie, Navy; Brig. Gen. Harry Crutcher Jr., Texas Air National Guard; Maj. Gen. Albert Sidney Johnson, Texas National Guard; Brig. Gen. Herbert D. Vogel, Army Corps of Engineers; Capt. Stanley C. Strong, Navy; Maj. Gen. Carl Phinney, Texas National Guard; Col. Harry H. Culler, Air Force; Lt. Col. George B. Thomas, Marine Corps; Col. D. Harold Byrd, CAP, and Maj. Gen. William B. Ruggles, Texas National Guard.

Open house will be held Sunday afternoon at Dallas Naval Air Station, Hensley Field, Love Field reserve buildings and the Navy reserve station on Bachman Boulevard.

Elsewhere in Texas, other ranking military officials and equipment were to be features of Armed Forces Day.

Gen. Nathan F. Twining, Air Force chief of staff, was to make a speech in Amarillo after presenting the Medal of Honor posthumously to Lt. Col. George Davis in Lubbock. The late officer's wife was to receive the award. Sen. Lyndon Johnson also was to speak in Amarillo.

Other officers to speak included Maj. Gen. P. P. Weyland, commander of the Tactical Air Command, in Houston; Maj. Gen. Morris J. Lee of the Air Force, Lubbock; Maj. Gen. G. P. Disoway of the Air Force, San Angelo; Rear Admiral Henry Crommelin, assistant chief of staff for naval operations, Abilene; Rear Admiral Stuart S. Murray, Navy inspector general, Vernon, and Brig. Gen. Nells H. Nelson of the Marine Corps, Waco.

Carswell Air Force Base, Fort Worth, was putting military planes on display, permitting the public to see a B-36 for the first time there. An atomic cannon was to be shown in San Antonio and a guided missile in El Paso. Navy ships were due in port at Houston, Port Arthur and Beaumont.

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Twining Reports Best Brains on 'Saucer' Studies

AMARILLO, Texas (UP)—Gen. Nathan F. Twining, the Air Force's chief of staff, said Saturday that the Air Force has the best brains in the country working on "the flying saucer problem."

Twining said that about 90 per cent of reports of flying saucers are pure imaginations. But the Air Force can't explain the other 10 per cent.

"We just don't know about that 10 per cent," he said. "If they are from Mars and there is a people and a world that far ahead of us, I don't think we have even to worry about it."

So far, he said, no facts have been uncovered to show that there is anything to flying saucers. But, he said, "some very reliable" persons have reported flying objects that can't be identified.

"We are certainly working on the problem and are not discounting all these reports," he said.
