Dear Mr. Greenwell:

Thank you for your letter of March 3rd with your comments concerning national representatives, and about our "chunk of metal" as we call it up here. I understand about the lack of specific representation in Canada. I was just curious as I noted there wasn't any as such.

Concerning our metal, a group of people in Ottawa, including myself, have possession of this very large artifact, and have for some time been arranging independent analyses in various labs, so that we may make a detailed comparison of the results of all tests conducted. This is essential in view of past experience as it is the only way we can establish anything with certainty, either positive or negative. Not all labs conduct the same tests, and even when they do, their methods sometimes differ.

We therefore need as many independent results as possible. Would it then be possible to obtain a copy of the report from Dr. Robert Johnston to aid in our comparative analysis?

You say that Dr. Millman has been most co-operative in this particular case. I wonder if he has told you everything. I have close personal contact with him, yet despite his outward appearance of co-operation, I have very strong reasons to suspect that it is not co-operation at all - reasons which are much too complicated to go into here. My file on this matter is growing fat!

Personally, I don't care whether this piece of metal is foundry slag or whatever; all I am interested in is settling this matter, as I have made quite clear to Peter Millman. He and his colleagues have placed obstacles in my path towards a settlement. He says it is foundry slag but will not produce the evidence to support this. This alone is cause for suspicion.
