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CASEBOOK OF A UFO INVESTIGATOR, by Raymond E. Fowler (1981, 246 pages)

An experienced and thorough UFO investigator relates in an interesting way some of his own and others' experiences with UFOs, with celestial and otherwise identifiable objects and discusses some problems and frustrations of UFO investigation. He presents a profile of the consistent characteristics of "real UFOs."

Several chapters deal with government investigations of UFOs, government harassment of witnesses, and with reported landings or crashes of disc-shaped objects over the years. A final chapter lists many investigative efforts in process around the world and raises thoughtful questions about new research into UFOs.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE FIRST INTERNATIONAL UFO CONGRESS June, 1977, sponsored by Fate Magazine, edited by Curtis Fuller (1980, 440 pages)

11 The presentations range from Kenneth Arnold's account of his historic sighting in 1947 to J. Allen Hynek's predictions about the future of ufology. Ted Phillips offers solid evidence of physical traces gathered from landing sites around the world. Ted Bloecher describes encounters with humanoids, and scientists and investigators discuss thought transference, UFOs as psychic constructs, UFO propulsion systems, hypnosis of imaginary abductees, cosmic brainwashing, "men in black," the reliability of UFO witnesses, and other subjects pertinent to the puzzle of UFOs.

12 The author of this book, a perceptual psychologist, "focuses upon various aspects of how the human sensory-perceptual-intellectual-emotional systems operate in the context of UFO encounters." He stresses the limited nature of our scientific understanding of reality and offers advice to investigators interviewing witnesses of UFO sightings, considers problems encountered in "Experiencing Something for the First Time," in "Invisibility," with lights at night, and with aircraft from several angles, and finishes with some preliminary conclusions about the study of the phenomenon.

UFO PHENOMENA AND THE BEHAVIORAL SCIENTIST edited by Dr. Richard F. Haines (1979, 440 pages)

Thirteen contributors discuss aspects of UFO reports that range from a thoughtful consideration of social conditioning forces that affect the reporting of UFO sightings, through the reasons that cause people to assume that unidentifiable objects would be extraterrestrial machines, to the possibility that the whole phenomenon is a product of our collective unconscious mind, or to another possibility that some/all sightings are caused by glowing lights made by rock fracturing in the earth. One long chapter is a detailed evaluation of the reports of Carl Higdon's 1974 encounter with a humanoid in Wyoming and abduction.

Included also are supporting speeches by Hynek, Vallee, Lt. Col. Coyne, Friedman, ex-astronaut Cooper (by letter) and Grenada's Min. of Educ., as well as the S.P.C.'s recommendation to the General Assembly of the United Nations.

FROM CANADA

PROJECT "MAGNET" REPORT AND PROJECT "SECOND STOREY" (1950, 47 pages)

The Second Storey Committee was sponsored by the Canadian Defense Research Board to collect, catalog and correlate data on UFO sightings. The report includes guidelines for reporting UFOs, lists of normal phenomena commonly mistaken for UFOs, sighting report forms, formulae for weighing sighting reports, sighting analysis charts, and summary of reports analyzed in 1952. The Project MAGNET committee utilized this report in making its study of the saucer phenomena and reaching its conclusion of the real existence of extraterrestrial vehicles.

REPORT ON UNIDENTIFIED AERIAL OBJECTS, from the Institute of Advanced Studies of National Defense; Association of Former Senior Officials and Auditors. Issued in France in 1977, translated and printed by the Center in 1980. (31 pages)

An analysis of the UFO phenomenon, of the attitudes of governments toward it, of its socio-psychological aspects (regarded in the report as more important than the phenomenon itself) and of considerations of national defense and UFOs. It concludes with recommendations for the collection and further study of UFO reports.

G.E.P.A.N.

The French National Center for Space Studies established in 1977 a Study Group for Unidentified Aerial Phenomena (G.E.P.A.N.). In 1980 and 1981 they published a series of Technical Reports, now available from UFO Information, in French with English summaries.
