Dear Mr. Hoover:

On June 26, 1956, I wrote you a letter concerning the F. B. I. and Mr. George Adamski of Palomar Terraces, Star Route, Valley Center, California. I asked you several questions concerning Mr. Adamski's affair with the F. B. I. I received a letter from your secretary, Helen W. Gandy, dated July 13, 1956. She said, "Your letter of June 26, 1956, has been received in the absence of Mr. Hoover from the city. For information concerning the matter to which you referred, you may wish to communicate with the Better Business Bureau, 1010 Lincoln Building, 742 South Hill Street, Los Angeles, California."

On July 20, 1956, I wrote a letter to the Better Business Bureau of Los Angeles, California. My letter to them reads as follows:

On June 26, 1956, I wrote a letter to Mr. John Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, concerning Mr. George Adamski of Palomar Terraces, Star Route, Valley Center, California. Mr. Hoover's secretary, Helen W. Gandy, has referred me to you for the information I desire.

There is a book written recently by the English publisher of Flying Saucers Have Landed by Mr. George Adamski. The English publisher's name is Mr. Waveney Girvan, and his book is called Flying Saucers and Common Sense. This book is published by the Citadel Press of 222 Fourth Avenue, New York 3, N. Y.

On pages 120 and 121 of Flying Saucers and Common Sense, it says, "On 17th December, 1953, George Adamski was visited by three F.B.I. agents who questioned him at some length on a radio interview which he gave on 7th December at Los Angeles. As a result of this broadcast a number of telephone calls had been made to their headquarters in Washington, D.C. Adamski was then warned to keep quiet and not to mention the government or any of its services. He was further warned that because of the broadcast a warrant for his arrest had been signed by the Attorney-General and that the next time a thing like this occurred he would be arrested."

This story sounds unbelievable and I am usually suspicious of anything that appears in a flying
