

UFOs A SCIENTIFIC DEBATE, Edited by Carl Sagan and Thornton Page. Ithaca, NY: Cornell University Press, 1974. (310 pages)

✓ The proceedings of an American Association for the Advancement of Science Special Symposium, in which fifteen scientists discuss various aspects of UFOs from exceedingly divergent points of view.

SITUATION RED, THE UFO SIEGE, Leonard Stringfield. New York: Doubleday, 1977. (224 pages)

✓ Relates the author's experiences in collecting sighting reports for the Air Force in the 1950s; recounts many of the cases he has investigated personally, including the concentration of sightings that formed, for the author, the "siege" of 1973, all in the context of a broad knowledge of the many aspects of the UFO phenomenon.

ANATOMY OF A PHENOMENON Unidentified Flying Objects in Space--A Scientific Appraisal, Jacques Vallee. Chicago: Henry Regnery Company, 1965. (210 pages)

✓ Dr. Vallee discusses in detail unsolved cases occurring between 1947 and 1964, a period of high activity. He examines the reactions of various groups and methods of investigation, proposes a system of classification and reviews several theories advanced to explain UFOs.

CHALLENGE TO SCIENCE: The UFO Enigma, Jacques and Janine Vallee. Chicago: Henry Regnery Company, 1966 (268 pages hardback, 328 pages paperback)

✓ Analyzes topographic and temporal patterns of sightings, reviews recent history of the UFO phenomenon and suggests avenues for productive research.

1973--YEAR OF THE HUMANOIDS, An Analysis of the Fall, 1973
UFO/Humanoid Wave, by David Webb, Second Edition (1976, 110 pages)

✓ This report presents in both narrative and chart form 70 reports (55 U.S.) of humanoid sightings from the period Aug.-Dec. 1973, including 6 reports (5 U.S.) of abductions. Characteristics of humanoids and abductions are discussed, and correlations made with previous UFO waves. Numerous tables, charts and illustrations illuminate the text.

THE UFOCAT CODEBOOK, David R. Saunders (1977, 41 pages)

The purpose and history of the compilation of UFOCAT--the computer catalog of over 80,000 entries reflecting approximately 50,000 sightings of UFOs--are described in this Codebook. The method of coding types and sub-types of reports, sources, dates, times, locations, names and number of witnesses and other pertinent information is detailed. This codebook is essential for interpreting information print-outs and for coding files for inclusion in the catalog. Packet of Sample Coding Sheets (10): These provide the 80 most important columns of the 120-column format.

"UFO CENTRAL" ANNUAL REPORT (1975, 28 pages)

This report gives an overall picture of the first year of operation (1974) of UFO CENTRAL, the Center's toll-free number used by official agencies to transmit UFO sighting reports. It discusses the agencies involved, and indicates the calls received, by category and geography. Included are copies of the directives sent to agencies, the Center's sighting report form, and UFO CENTRAL forms.

POLICE AND THE UFO ENCOUNTER (1975, 17 pages)

This report describes the cooperation and involvement of police in UFO CENTRAL, concentrating on the number and types of police-witnessed sightings reported. The period from January 1 through October 31, 1974, is analyzed with respect to the use of UFO CENTRAL by police.
