

Because of the persistence of reports of UFO sightings over many years on a world-wide basis, the Center for UFO Studies was founded in 1973 with the primary objective of promoting serious research into the phenomenon. The Center's chief functions are:

1. To provide a central clearinghouse to which anyone can report UFO experiences without fear of ridicule or publicity, but with assurance that all reports will be given serious investigation by qualified personnel.
2. To publish newsletters of current UFO sighting investigations and other relevant matters--The International UFO Reporter and the CUFOS Associates Newsletter.
3. To maintain, and make available to all serious qualified UFO researchers, as complete and current a file of UFO reports as possible, both in narrative file form and in a computerized data bank--UFOCAT, as well as a library of books about UFOs.
4. To enlist laboratory and other technical analyses of significant sighting reports from all over the world.
5. To promote public knowledge and understanding of the UFO phenomenon by providing as reliable information as possible, including the material for sale in this catalog, as well as speakers for public meetings and organized groups.
6. To encourage research by providing a publishing source of selected, refereed, technical papers, The Journal of UFO Studies.
7. To seek contributions of funds, talent and facilities for the above purposes, from those who are similarly interested in discovering the nature and significance of this increasingly important scientific and sociological phenomenon.

CATALOGUES OF UFO SIGHTINGS

UFO REPORTS INVOLVING VEHICLE INTERFERENCE: A Catalogue and Data Analysis, by Mark Rodeghier. (1981, 144 pages)

After summarizing 441 incidents in which UFOs were sighted and nearby vehicles (primarily but not exclusively autos) were affected in one way or another, Rodeghier discusses the characteristics of the phenomenon (or phenomena) and provides a detailed statistical treatment of the data, with chi-square analysis of selected characteristics. He finds three nexuses of characteristics; two of them seem to indicate the presence of a physical object, and the third a possible natural phenomenon.

1973--YEAR OF THE HUMANIDS: An Analysis of the Fall, 1973 UFO-Humanoid Wave (Second Edition) by David Webb. (1976, 110 pages)

Within the wave of sightings that took place in the U.S. and Canada in 1973, there were 70 reports of humanoid sightings. They are carefully described and compared to reports of incidents that occurred during earlier UFO waves. Six of the reports are of temporary abductions. Numerous tables, charts and illustrations illuminate the text.

A CATALOGUE OF 200 TYPE-1 UFO EVENTS IN SPAIN AND PORTUGAL, Vicente-Juan Ballester-Olmos (1976, 77 pages)

This catalogue gives brief summaries of 200 landing or near landing UFO cases dating from 1914 to January, 1975, along with the source(s) of information and references to additional material, where available. First-hand information obtained directly from witnesses comprises 67% of the cases. Also included are photos and drawings of 18 separate cases, charts illustrating the temporal and geographic distribution of cases, and copious references.
