OBSERVATIONS OF ANOMALOUS ATMOSPHERIC PHENOMENA IN THE U.S.S.R.: A Statistical Analysis, by Gindilis, Menkov and Petrovskaya. (Institute of Space Research Report Pr. 473, 1979). Translated as N.A.S.A. Technical Memorandum No. 75665 and printed by the Center in 1980. (63 pages)

Based on the UFO reports collected by Felix Zigel, the authors analyze the general characteristics of the sightings, the circumstances of observation, the witnesses, spatial and temporal distribution of the events, and their duration. They classify the phenomena by types of objects, by object structure and/or nature of luminosity, by angular dimensions of objects and by their characteristics. They include estimates of distance, altitude, size and velocity, discuss associated effects and phenomena, and conclude with a discussion of the reliability of the material and observational characteristics of the phenomena, and finally, they state their conclusions about the nature of the objects and the need for further research.

6 From a night in 1953 when two young women had a dramatic UFO sighting, through twenty years of similar incidents experienced by associates of one of the women, the authors take the reader through the situations as brought out by interviews, sometimes by hypnotic regression, comparing them to other reported experiences in the process. Each author and one of the witnesses contribute a chapter of their individual conclusions about the experiences and the UFO phenomenon. Startling and thought-provoking.

A GEO-BIBLIOGRAPHY OF ANOMALIES: Primary Access to Observations of UFOs, Ghosts and Other Mysterious Phenomena, by George M. Eberhart (1980, 1114 pages)

7 Within the broad classifications of Phenomena within One Reality (Borderland Science and Parapsychology), Phenomena Dealing with Other Realities, and Borderland History, Eberhart has listed over 22,000 separate events under 10,500 geographic place names in North America. These are taken from published sources and are listed by location, with cross-references by subject, observer, ships and ethnic groups. He includes an eye-opening Glossary of Terms. This is especially valuable for the UFO researcher who knows the location of an event but not the date, the usual primary locator.

9 In January 1967, Betty Andreasson, her children and her parents were startled when the lights in their house suddenly went out and a pulsating glow suffused their back yard. The family was left with confused memories of a bizarre event. In 1975, after reading about the Center, Mrs. Andreasson wrote to Dr. Hynek, describing what she remembered of that night. Raymond Fowler recounts the year-long investigation, assisted by hypnotic regression, that eventually followed.
