Worldwide travel collaborating with leading researchers, interviewing important witnesses, and discussing the subject with
 pilots, astronauts, scientists and politicians, has established Timothy Good as one of this country's authorities, and the
 foremost lecturer on Unidentified Flying Objects, with a specialised knowledge of cases involving actual contact with the
 occupants of UFOs — Close Encounters of the Third Kind.

TIMOTHY GOOD ON UFOs

He first became interested in the subject in 1955, when his passion for aviation and space led to reading a book by Major
 David Keyhoe which detailed sightings by military and civilian pilots, astronomers, missile experts, air traffic controllers,
 radar operators, and other highly-qualified witnesses, impressed with the evidence he studied further books on UFOs, and
 in 1961 began his own independent research into the subject.

Since 1967 Timothy Good has lectured throughout the United Kingdom, at universities, schools, churches, libraries, and to
 many other organizations, including Rotary, Round Table, Royal Air Forces Association, 41 Club, 18 Plus Group, Young
 Conservatives, Women's Institute, centres of the Institution of Post Office Electrical Engineers, and at many Ladies
 Luncheon Clubs. In June 1980 he addressed the prestigious House of Lords All Party UFO Study Group.

He has acted as consultant to BBC Television for several UFO documentaries, including a Horizon programme, and has
 made regular appearances on Tyne Tees Television. He has also been interviewed on BBC Radio 4, Radio London, LBC, and
 other local stations both here and in the United States. In 1979 he was invited to NASA at Houston in order to discuss areas of
 mutual interest with a physicist who is unofficially engaged in UFO research.

He is co-author of an important new book — due to be published in 1981 — which investigates the controversial claims of
 George Adamski.

Timothy Good is also a professional violinist, who has played with most of London's orchestras since 1963, particularly the
 London Symphony Orchestra, to which he belonged for many years. He now combines a busy freelance schedule of mostly
 commercial TV and recording work with UFO research and his ever-increasing lecture appearances.

Although both format and duration of a talk can be varied to suit individual requirements, three basic types of presentation
 are offered as follows:

- 1) 30 MINUTE TALK
- 2) 60 MINUTE ILLUSTRATED TALK (35mm Slides)
- 3) 25 MINUTE INTRODUCTORY TALK FOLLOWED BY 50 MINUTES' ILLUSTRATION

A question and answer session normally concludes each talk, during which sceptical enquiry is appreciated. The speaker
 does not seek to prove his case — nothing short of arriving at the venue in a flying saucer could do this — but he does aim to
 provide a stimulating and enjoyable discourse on this most exciting and provocative subject.
