Dear Dr. Walker:

Last Wednesday evening you and I had a short conversation on UFOs; a subject that you don't want to talk about. I can appreciate your position on the matter, and I want to apologize if I seemed like I was prying into your past involvement in a subject that is of great interest to me.

For twenty years I have researched this subject which seems to lead in so many directions that it's hard to keep track. But last year some startling information was released that pinpointed meetings at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base on the subject matter you and I discussed on the phone, and you were identified as one of those present at the meetings, among others. I called you because you are practically in my backyard, and know the story first hand.

The subject matter of retrievals and extraterrestrials discussed at those meetings that you attended are really no longer a secret; nor are the identities of Bush and the other Majestic-12 members.

Dr. Walker, you have a right to your privacy. Just as I have a right to make sure the research reports crossing my desk are true and correct. As a civilian 'expert' in this field, I feel obligated to make sure what I say is right. If I don't, conjecture can become fact and untruths can become truths.
