Thank you for your recent letters of 5 and 16 November. Very interesting stuff that you sent to me. I wonder what the truth really is concerning Walker.

Regarding Topside, there are ten issues, with a total of 72 pages, from March 1960 until Smith's death in December 1962. If you want that, you may also want the Memorial Edition of 30 pages which is filled with WBS's writings. This was the first issue after his death. If you want me to photocopy this, I will have to charge you as I will have to pay 15c per copy at a local Kwik Copy shop as I have no free access to a copier, being retired. Please let me know your wishes.

I can't think of any questions to which I know the answer but it has not been published, off hand, without checking all through my files. If I think of something, I will let you know.

I am puzzled by the so-called "Walker Report" which you say T. Scott Crain wrote. What is this report all about and to whom will the report go? Is it to be published, or what? You have not made this at all clear so you will have to pardon my confusion. I appreciate you sending me pages 8 and 9 for me to see. It is a bad situation when such misinformation is published in a book (Steinman's) because readers are unaware of the incorrect data. I am highly annoyed with Steinman about this and I told him so in a letter. It did not seem to bother him too much. Anyway, why put all the detail of how the report came to light, or who found it, etc? This is all unnecessary detail and does not matter a damn. It is best omitted. At least by not stating anything about such details, there should be no errors or misunderstandings. And I don't really feel like spending the time to rewrite this to get it right. And what is all this about Steinman saying people are to be "bumped off" and others sued?

Anyway, to answer your specific questions:

1 & 2. I was the first person to possess a copy of the Top Secret memo, after Smith's widow. She gave me most of Smith's

files somewhere between 15 and 20 years ago. I kept this under wraps for quite a few years because I was serving in the Canadian Armed Forces (Navy) at the time and the possession of a Top Secret document certainly did not give me the right to make it public. I could have been court martialled had I done so, under The Official Secrets Act. Eventually, the DND file was declassified and someone got a copy of it and published it. This may have been Mr.X, I am not certain. However, I had made this document available to various people after it was declassified.

3. Jim Smith had some of his father's files and I got a few from him, also.

re the Sarbacher interview, I received this at the same time as the Top Secret memo as it was in the same file. The same situation applies to it because of the security classification.

4. I did not receive the files from Mrs Smith because of my book. I had been given them some years previously, as stated above.

I cannot think of anything right now which should not be printed. I guess any material I have given to you can be printed, but I suppose it would be a prudent step on your part to let me see such material first, just to protect yourself.

No, I do not have a bio on Bremner. I have no idea how Bremner found Sarbacher so fast, but what do you mean by "so fast"? I really don't understand this question. Smith had had contact with several officials in the USA on the UFO matter, so I don't think that making contacts was any problem for him, especially as a senior government official with direct access to the Canadian Embassy. All I can say about Bremner is that he was a Lieutenant Commander in the Canadian Navy and I knew him casually while I was in the Navy also. *him*

When did Smith get interested in UFOs, you asked. As I stated in The Encyclopedia of UFOs, (p.336), he got interested in the late 1940's after reading a magazine article. I cannot be more specific as I do not know.

I believe this covers your questions for now, so will close.

Thanks very much for sending the material re MJ - 12. It is excellent.

In Keyhoe, Flying Saucers from Outer Space, pp 133-136, Keyhoe copies verbatim Smith's rewrite of an article written by Keyhoe (intended for publication in TRUE magazine). It is verbatim, as I have compared this with a copy of the 5-page revision which Smith wrote for that article. Smith obtained security clearance on that article from Dr. O. M. Solandt, Chairman, Defence Research Board. He also suggested to Solandt that it would require clearance by the United States Research and Development Board. Keyhoe states (p.133) that the Canadian Joint Staff (CJS) in Washington cleared it with the Pentagon.

According to Dr. Sarbacher's letter of November 3, 1983 to Bill Steinman (1986 MUFON Proceeding, p.75) a Dr. Compton was head of the Research and Development Board. (A copy of this letter just received from you by separate mail.)

These statements by Smith, therefore, had official approval of both the Canadian and U.S. governments.

Is it possible that MJ-12 was in fact the U.S. Research and Development Board? If not, perhaps it was a committee of that Board!

In Smith's request for approval of Magnet (21 Nov.'50), he did in fact refer to what I now assume was MJ-12 (contrary to my statement in my previous letter). He stated:

"c. Their modus operandi is unknown but concentrated effort is being made by a small group headed by Dr. Vannevar Bush".

No doubt, this "small group" was MJ-12.

LCDR (Lieutenant Commander) Bremner was a Canadian Naval Officer attached to the Canadian Joint Staff in Washington, who did a bit of WBS' leg work for him down there.

Looking forward to receipt of any more MJ-12 material you can send me. Let me know of any charges for the photocopying so I can reimburse you.

Re the "Notes on discussion with Sarbacher 8/5/85". Very interesting indeed, and thank you very much. One question -- who conducted this interview with Sarbacher? The notes don't identify the interviewer.

Dear Art,

Thanks very much for your letter of November 2. Regarding the Wilbert Smith information; I am primarily interested in the specific details of the information Smith allegedly obtained from UFO occupants, the experiments he conducted utilizing this information, etc. For example, in one of his talks, he mentioned communication with a being named "Tylla" (phonetic spelling) and went on to describe/explain a particular UFO sighting, based on information received from this source. I had a tape of this at one time, but loaned it out and it was never returned. So far as I know, this was never mentioned in any of his writings, so I feel sure there must be a lot of other material relating to the contacts/experiments which has been kept confidential. Do you think Mrs. Smith would be willing to respond to a detailed questionnaire regarding her late husband's work?

No, unfortunately, I cannot suggest a reliable place to send negatives for computer enhancement, as Spaulding is the only person I know of who is doing this sort of thing. As I mentioned previously, I place no credence whatsoever in anything originating with either Hewes or Spaulding. I agree with you that sending anything to CUFOs is a complete waste of time, so I can't recommend them either. If I learn of anyone doing analyses of negatives, I'll be glad to let you know.

Not much else to pass along from here at the moment, so I'll sign off for now and will be looking forward to hearing from you again soon.

She recalls some communication with Tylla (not sure of the spelling) but is certain Wilbert never put anything in writing about this. She was unaware of such a tape.

The main information he received via his communications with Affa, which enabled him to conduct experiments, pertained to the binding meter. The story of this is outlined on pages 72 and 73 of my latest book.

He was also given information which led him to conduct experiments on anti-gravity, with which he had some success. Unfortunately, his records of all this seem to have disappeared.

Most of the other information he received pertained to the nature and structure of the universe, which is all contained in his book The New Science.

Mrs. Smith would not be willing to respond to a detailed questionnaire.

It is too bad you do not know of some reliable place I can send my photo for analysis. We obviously have a serious gap in UFO research, when we do not have a reliable place for this work to be done. A pity.

Cameron has no plans at present for any book. That seems to settle this matter, I guess.

Dear Mr. Bray:

I have recently re-read your paper presented to the 1982 MUFON Symposium in Canada and regret the fact that I did not write to you sooner. After speaking with Bill Moore concerning Project STORK and the Wilber Smith Memos I realize that these matters were far more important than either of us knew at the time!

Project STORK (SECRET) prepared what he believes was Project Blue Book Report No. 13. This was later to be released as Special Rep. No. 14 with a new conclusion stating that there was no evidence indicating that UFOs were extraterrestrial. Yet at the same time the actual report was encouraging! Note the enclosed document which refers to Project STORK on page two. Notice the cronology of events. Reports 1-12 were issued on a tri-monthly basis, No. 12 being issued on September 30, 1953. This would make the STORK Report no. 13, issued by 19 December, 1953.

Concerning the research of Wilber Smith I do have a copy of the Project Magnet Report and the previously TOP SECRET Department of Transport Memo. I am not only convinced that the document is authentic, but also believe that the information Smith obtained via the Canadian Embassy was 100% fact of the matter. Dr. Bush was a highly respected scientist at the highest government levels and would have been the perfect choice for such a project. This seems to tie in with the Roswell incident of July 7th, 1947, and any similar type incidents which occurred not long afterward. As far as Scully's book is concerned, I am still open to the possibility that it could have been an exaggerated version of a very real event. What ever the truth may be, the matter is still ^{undoubtedly} the most highly classified subject within the United States Government. Any government which could duplicate UFO technology would be in a very secure position indeed.

Anyway, you do deserve thanks for your persistence in drawing attention to an important matter, whether it was appreciated at the time or not. In the mean time I am going to trace as much information on Dr. Bush and Dr. Sarbacker. I suspect that their TOP SECRET UFO Project had the concrete answers we all have been waiting for!

I also wanted to ask you if your book "The UFO Connection" is still available and if the notes Smith made of his interview with Dr. Sarbacker are in the book.

Dear Sir:

Thank you for your letter of January 25 in reply to mine of December 1, 1970.

I am surprised that no scientific report is available on your UAP studies. I would think that some formal report in published form is required in justification of three years work, even if nothing resulted from the study. I would think, also, that your project must have been financed at least partially from public funds - grants from the Provincial government or NRC. If so, taxpayers are entitled to know how the money was spent and whether anything in the way of scientific knowledge was gained.

Further, the co-operation of the public was requested at the outset of this study. Even if little public assistance was provided, they are still entitled to a report.

Other scientific groups around the world have been studying this phenomenon also, and in the interestsof normal exchange of scientific information, they also are entitled to the results of your research. Is nothing being published for their benefit either?

As a private researcher, I tried to obtain details of your work while it was in progress, but met with no success, as I stated in my brief to the Senate Committee on Science Policy. Does this situation still prevail? Reports of other research projects of UTIAS are made available to any interested parties, so why not this one? This would appear to be another good example of why private researchers make the claim that it is most difficult, if not impossible, to get information from "official" bodies.

I hope I will hear further from you concerning this matter in the very near future.
