

According to [redacted] these "bells" or "flying saucers" would appear over many nations of the world during the latter part of August 1954, and would come close enough to the earth so that they could be seen by man and that they in turn would be able to see people on the street. b7c

[redacted] stated that [redacted] wrote a letter to MARGARET GRASE SMITH, Senator from Maine, concerning this information, who forwarded the information to the Secretary of Defense and copies were sent to the Army, Navy, and Air Force. According to [redacted] also wrote a letter to the President of the United States. b7c

[redacted] stated that none of the persons involved in this matter were interested in publicity. He stated that he would be willing to assist the Bureau in the investigation of this matter if the Bureau desired, inasmuch as he believed [redacted] and [redacted] had confidence in him. b7c

[redacted] described [redacted] as being of middle-class circumstances, having a very modest home with furniture below middle-class. He stated that she has [redacted] b7c
He considered her to be a [redacted] person, [redacted]
[redacted] and one who has studied [redacted]

The above information is being made available to the Office of Special Investigations, United States Air Force, and no further action is being taken by this office.

MISCELLANEOUS - INFORMATION CONCERNING

On July 29, 1954, Mr. John Ratson, Security Officer, Bureau of Aeronautics, United States Navy Department, and Commander L. I. McQuiston, United States Navy, furnished the following information to this Bureau.

They advised that the Office of Naval Intelligence had forwarded a file to the Bureau of Aeronautics with enclosures which had been received from [redacted] b7c
[redacted] According to [redacted] and [redacted] resided near [redacted] who had been receiving messages through thought transmission. [redacted] approached [redacted] and advised him that "flying saucers" were here to help mankind. Information received by [redacted] indicated that [redacted] became interested in the messages received by [redacted] and felt that the matter should be investigated by the Government.

[redacted] advised that [redacted] wrote to Admiral Epre, Director of Naval Intelligence, on June 1, 1954, enclosing some of the messages received by [redacted] b7c
[redacted] Received no reply to his original communication, again wrote to the Director of Naval Intelligence on June 7, 1954. [redacted] advised that the first letter that
