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to time" leads me to conclude that Edwards was not that interested and was giving Smith a polite brush-off. What a way to authorise a top secret project! It is laughable.

Regarding the category 'Above Top Secret', I have an Executive Order, signed by Ronald Reagan, which clearly states the three levels of classification in the US. I imagine the same applies in Canada and the UK. These are 'Top Secret', 'Secret', and 'Confidential'. There are no others, and thus no such thing as 'Above Top Secret', so what is Donald Glaser talking about?
