Dear Grant:

Received both of your letters, Nov 18 and Dec 1, 88. I will attempt to answer your questions the best I can.

In the May 1950 Issue of Fate magazine, Ray Palmer wrote an article entitled "Space ships, Flying Saucers and Clean Noses" (copy attached).

I contacted Alma Lawson, now deceased, who in turn verified the Scientist as Dr. Luis Walter Alvarez, also now deceased. I contacted Dr. Alvarez in private, when he admitted that he did take part in the recovery of a Saucer in Mexico. He would not go into detail concerning the events and who else was involved. I wrote him a formal letter, trying to get him to answer me in writing concerning his experience concerning the Mexican recovery. He would not answer (copy of my letter attached)

As you know Lloyd V. Berkner, mentioned on the MJ-12 papers, was also a member of the Robertson Panel. Berkner was very close to Dr. Vannevar Bush and was head of the Department of Terrestrial Magnetism at the Carnegie Institute, where Bush was Head.

Dear Dr. Alvarez:

Allow me to introduce myself. My name is William S. Steinman, I am a free-lance investigator into the subject matter pertaining to the military recovery of crashed and/or disabled Flying Saucers, during the time period 1947-1953. This investigation also involves the governments attempted duplication programs of these Flying Saucers.

I understand, through very reliable sources, that you and other members of the Physics Department at the University of California took part in one or more of these Flying Saucer recovery operations. One of these crash/recovery operations took place in the Sierra Madre, on a mesa, in mid Mexico sometime in October or November of 1949. Another recovery took place 12 miles north-east of Aztec, New Mexico, in late March of 1948. The earliest recovery was of a severely damaged saucer, whose skin was blasted away which was subsequently found on a ranch near Roswell, New Mexico; and the burned out and badly damaged hull was found on the Plains of St. Augustine near Magdalena and Socorro, New Mexico in July of 1947.

The branch of the military that was in charge of these recovery operations was The Interplanetary Phenomenon Unit of The Scientific and Technical Branch of Army Counter Intelligence, DA., working in conjunction with the Air Force and Technical and Scientific advisors such as yourself. This Unit was Deactivated in the late 1950's.

The duplication program began around late 1949 and/or early 1950 by Dr. Vannevar Bush, Dr. Eric Henry Wang, and others in the laboratories at the Department of Special Studies, Structures Division, Old Wright Air Development Center, Dayton, Ohio. The Program was moved to Kirtland Air Force Base, Albuquerque, New Mexico, in 1956, with Dr. Eric H. Wang relocating along with it. Dr. Wang contributed quite a bit to the Duplication Program. His untimely death in December of 1960 left a large gaping hole in the program.

Dr. Alvarez, one of my main concerns about all of this, centers around all of the unnecessary above-Top Secret, Need-To-Know atmosphere surrounding this whole affair. You were a member of the C.I.A. sponsored Scientific Study Group headed up by Dr. Robertson of California Institute of Technology, in 1953, known as "The Robertson Panel", which primary aim was to study the above mentioned situation and resolve just exactly what the public was to know in regards to it. The conclusion was to debunk, explain away, and downgrade all UFO reportings. This was carried out by infiltrating

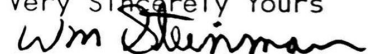
the Flying Saucer Clubs and/or Study groups, making persons look ridiculous who report anything pertaining to UFO's, controlling the News Media's reporting of the UFO subject matter, discrediting persons who get too close to the truth of the matter, and making the whole subject matter appear as undesirable to the public as possible, to discourage public interest. The "bottom line" purpose of the "Robertson Panel", as you probably well know, was to clamp the "Security Lid" down very tight on the subject matter and keep it that way.

Dr. Alvarez, my primary aim is to persuade the government to turn this whole Flying Saucer Duplication Program over to the total scientific community where it can be handled in a proper atmosphere of true unhindered methodology. I believe that the stringent Above-Top-Secret, Need-To-Know atmosphere only hinders progress in the solving of the problem of the Saucers' Mode of Operation. The idea of substituting a nuclear power plant in place of the original undeciphered means of operation, only downgrades the original craft, which probably operates on a basic technology far in advance of our most advanced technological concepts. I believe, that under less stringent conditions coupled with a pooled effort of the total scientific community, we could unlock the secrets of that advanced technology in a very short period of time, as opposed to the 36 plus years of getting literally no where at all. Please verify to me that you were involved in the recovery operations by forwarding photographic evidence and/or written documentation. Also, please utilize your influence in government circles to make my suggestion a reality.

I will be looking forward to a reply from you as soon as possible. Thank you for your help in this extremely important subject matter.

Interplanetary Saucers Discovered in Mexico?

Those fascinating flying saucers which fired the imagination of Americans two summers ago have come south of the Rio Grande with an almost plausible twist.

It has been reported that dwarf men from another planet have penetrated the earth's atmosphere in a huge disk.

Two reports of silvery "platos voladores" as the disks are called in Mexico, were made almost simultaneously by commercial fliers about two weeks ago—one at Nogales, 60 miles south of Tucson, Ariz., and another at Tampico, 75 miles north of Mexico City on the Gulf of Mexico.

A third report was that a huge "plato volador" had made a soft landing on a mesa deep in the mountainous reaches of the Sierra Madre.

A native shepherd is said to have discovered the disk. Inside it, he reportedly found the charred and burned bodies of six men, all no taller than 30 inches.

Alma Lawson, a Los Angeles business woman, confided she had received this "authentic" information from a "sober and conservative" scientist friend whose name she refused to divulge.

She said he had been in the scientific expedition which visited the site about 15 days ago. Among the men were several physicists from the University of California, Miss Lawson said.

"The disk did not come from Russia," she declared. "All the information has been kept a closely guarded secret by both the American and Mexican Governments for fear of throwing the world into a turmoil."

Quizzed by the baffled but interested United States Embassy at Mexico City, the Mexican Ministry of Foreign Affairs dismissed the report as unfounded.

"We have no information on which to base any comment," it said.

At the outset a degree of credulity was given Miss Lawson's

statement that both governments had ordered top-ranking American doctors and military men to the Capital, allegedly to examine the bodies.

Embassy officials, however, explained there was no secrecy involved in the congregation here of American Brass.

They are attending the Twelfth International Congress of Military Medicine and Pharmacy. Officials from 30 nations are meeting in Mexico City to set up an international code of military medicine.

The Lawson plato volador was a brownish metal, differing in color from the two disks reportedly seen by the pilots. About 100 feet in diameter, Miss Lawson said, the flying saucer was "so hard a hack-saw could not cut it."

She said her scientist friend had told her that the disk was shaped like a turtle and had a dirigible-like suspended cabin about 15 feet long.

Inside were the charred bodies of the midget men from another world, she said. One was sitting at the controls.

Miss Lawson said she had been informed that all six perished when the disk crashed into the earth's atmosphere, the friction setting them afire.

Automatic controls apparently guided the ship to a "soft and easy" landing.

The midget men bore all the physical and anatomical similarities to the human beings inhabiting the earth, Miss Lawson said she was informed by the scientist.

"This is 100 percent reliable," she insisted. "All of this information comes from an authentic source who is a very conservative man."

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lishes a report by two Death Valley prospectors of a 24-foot disk landing in the desert at a speed of 300 miles an hour.

The prospectors, Buck Fitzgerald and Maze Garney, asserted they chased two 24-inch gents over a sand dune before losing them.

Army Intelligence refused to swallow that one. Magazines such as this, it said, seldom have any evidence to support their fantasies.

There you have it. The "popular magazine" referred to is FATE. The news story says it (FATE) "now publishes a report." Actually FATE only *repeated* the report published by International News Service, and printed in hundreds of the nation's newspapers. Therefore, the "suggestion," by inference, that FATE was the originator of the report, is a sample of how attempts are made to mislead. Does the use of the word "now" simply mean that Army Intelligence got "on the ball" the minute they read FATE to attempt to discredit the magazine? We think so. To sock it in solid, they add that snide remark at the end of the article (which is certainly not "news") that "magazines such as this seldom have any evidence to support their fantasies."

Right there is a sample of research, Army Intelligence style. They label the story a "fantasy" *without* investigating. How do they *know* it is a fantasy, if they did not investigate? Is it fair to judge, without evidence? The Army says

that's the way *they* judge. They admit it in part.

Well, maybe the Army dropped the Wisconsin investigation "right there," but FATE didn't. FATE went up there and discovered the following:

In and around the Waupaca area, Stevens Point, Wisconsin Rapids, dozens of reports were made, simultaneously, by farmers and small city folk, of "flying disks." All agreed that they were "tiny and brilliant" and flying both swiftly and slowly, and maneuvering in a way that eliminated the possibility of meteoric phenomenon. At least one person was injured by one. They either struck the ground and exploded violently, or exploded low over the ground. Fragments picked up looked like pieces of plaster of paris. Fragments were remarkably few in number considering the apparent dimensions of the objects. All of the reports FATE investigated were from honest, sane, hard-working farmers, at least one of them a very good friend of mine.

What these objects were, FATE has no theory to explain. All it knows is that they *were* seen, they maneuvered intelligently, they exploded, they left visible residue like plaster, they injured at least one person, they appeared in dozens of different localities in a hundred-mile area, and there were *no* little men, in uniforms or otherwise.

As for the Death Valley report,

FATE covered that two issues ago. We pointed out that here, also, the Army *seemed* to go to great lengths to investigate in a particularly inept manner. Actually, we believe they investigated the matter thoroughly, and found it worthy of hushing up. But we don't believe they know any more than we learned from our Wisconsin investigation. In short, they are as baffled as we, but wouldn't admit it.

If the saucers were not founded on fact, why would they spend two years investigating 240 reports?

The newspaper story is singularly silent on whether or not Army Intelligence investigated the Sierra Madre turtle-disk affair, and the charred corpses of the six 30-inch men, although it is very explicit about establishing the insanity of the Wisconsin farmer (whose name, by the way, was what?). If there were no charred corpses, they ought positively to state the fact. Now we're suspicious. We think there might possibly have been charred corpses, since it wasn't denied.

But of course, we are not to be given any information such as this. We citizens aren't supposed to be told, if there are spaceships from other worlds coming here, and actual other world beings' corpses found in their burned ship. We wonder why we can't be told? This is *news*.

We have already reproduced the non-secret portion of the official Project Saucer report made up by

Wright-Patterson Army Intelligence officers. This non-secret report says the flying saucers are *real*. That there is a secret portion to the report leads us to believe that the information in it is even more sensational. Isn't it any of we taxpayer's business? Are we in danger of being eaten by the nasty Martians, and not even being given the courtesy of providing our own salt? "Ya' seen any little 30-inch men around?"

Whoever wrote that story ought to write for radio comedians — he's funny as a crutch.

And, since Army Intelligence won't report on the Mexico story, we will. Here it is: (the story is by Sam Petok, Free Press Staff Writer, who got his information second hand from Alma Lawson, a Los Angeles business woman, who got it from a "sober and conservative scientist friend" whose name she refused to divulge. Pretty lousy evidence, but since Army Intelligence chose to mention the matter in showing how little evidence FATE has to support *its* fantasies, we'll have to present the matter with as exact information as it is possible to secure.)

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FATE has no faith in this story. The story, as it stands, is heresy.

If it is true, and it might be, we'll certainly get no information out of Army Intelligence and if said scientist were to come out and back Miss Lawson up, he'd be left high and dry with his "fantasy," simply because he couldn't show a "fried corpse" of a little man, or even a fragment of a plato volador. If he had a fragment, it would be termed "metallic rock found all through the Sierra Madre Mountains." Only, if you actually hunted for it, as at Tacoma, Washington, you'd find it singularly hard to find. All this, as the story by Miss Lawson states, "for fear of throwing the world into a turmoil."

Recently I was in New York city, where I met Stuart Rose, one of the editors of the *Saturday Evening Post*. I had arranged to meet with him on a story regarding another matter, and during the course of discussion, I resorted to a little trickery as follows:

"Mr. Rose, you ran one of my articles a few months ago."

"Is that so?" said Mr. Rose. "What article was that?"

"The Flying Saucer story, which you ran in two installments."

"Oh yes, peculiar thing, that was . . ."

Here's where I resorted to a little trickery. Said I, casually: "Yes, wasn't it? I had a letter from the General the other day, admitting that the whole thing was inspired by the Army, and that the *Post* was only acceding to a request that the

article be featured as a special favor."

Said Rose. "I still don't understand that whole affair. It was the craziest thing. I never did know what it was all about."

"Apparently it was an effort to reassure the American people regarding the flying saucers," I said. "Many people are quite worried about them. And by the way, it certainly was not a very nice trick to play on the *Post* to announce, the very day the magazine appeared on the news stands, that the flying saucers were 'no joke.'"

Mr. Rose didn't say anything to that, but in his shoes I would have been very annoyed. It made a liar out of the *Post*.

"By the way," I went on. "I appreciate all the publicity the article gave to FATE. It helped our sale substantially."

Mr. Rose smiled wryly. "The *Post* never gives publicity like that," he said. "I can well understand your appreciation. But this was certainly unusual."

"I could really give you a flying saucer story," I remarked.

Mr. Rose could not have looked more disinterested.

In the light of this conversation, it would seem that little more need be said regarding the *Post*'s saucer story. It was a fiasco that is typical of the lack of liason between the branches of the Army. The Army inspires a story about how unreal the flying saucers are, while the

RECORD OF TELEPHONE CALL DECEMBER 24, 1988

During the half-hour phone call a number of things were discussed. The most interesting was when I asked Steinman about William L. Moore Jr. "What did Moore do before he was a school teacher?" Steinman like everybody else said he didn't know. At that point though he told a story that seemed to confirm Moore is much more than just a researcher.

In Steinman's book he prints a transcript of an interview that he did with Mrs. Eric Wang who's identity he hides. Dr. Wang, head of the Special Studies Section at Wright-Patterson AFB from 1952-56, the section was then moved to Sandia where Wang ran it until 1960 when Wang died. In Steinman's account he refers to a phone call that he got two days later after interviewing Mrs. Wang. He refers to him only as a prominent researcher. In the phone call Steinman confirmed my suspicions that this person was William Moore.

Moore said you've been talking to Mrs. Wang. Steinman immediately asked Moore how he was aware of this. Moore stated he had intelligence sources. Moore asked did you talk to Dorothy at the library? (Steinman identifies Dorothy McKimmom as the librarian at Kirkland AFB) Steinman said no, who's Dorothy? Moore identified parts of the conversation to Steinman to prove that he knew what the phone call was about. Steinman again pressed Moore how he knew all this.

Moore stated come over tomorrow and I'll tell you about it. Moore's story to Steinman is as follows. While at University (we don't have the year yet) the CIA was recruiting on American campuses. Moore was approached by the CIA to work for them. Moore told Steinman he didn't want to work for the CIA, but he did do some "footwork" for them and "wrote a couple of reports" for the CIA. When Moore became a research writer he renewed the ties that he had made with the CIA, and in Moore's words he is using the CIA. He claims this is how he got access to the deep throat sources.

Steinman stated that the ID that Moore showed Lee Graham was from Defense Intelligence Services.

Steinman told me that Moore had provided him a forty-five minute tape of the phone conversation between Stanton Friedman and Dr. R. Sarbacher. Steinman has promised to provide me a copy of this tape. It is on this tape that Sarbacher describes Walker and states that he was at all the Wright-Patterson meetings.

Steinman stated that he will be receiving a copy of the video tape of Richard Doty from John Lear, and will be providing me a copy.

Robert Collins (Condor) is according to Steinman sources now in the Mid-West. He retired from Sandia a month before the October 14th special.

At Sandia Labs Steinman claims there is a group known as "New Science Advocates" based on the book "New Science" written by Wilbert Smith. They apparently even have published some papers. Steinman says that they're no longer at the old address but that he will find an address for me. Apparently, a number of physicists at Sandia belong to this group.

Steinman also gave me the name of a man who apparently has a lot of Smith's gravity-electromagnetic papers. His name is Alex Pazarro in North Vancouver. 604-985-6836 or 926-7491.

Steinman claims Moore spent alot of time around Sandia and what he called the Albuquerque crew. Steinman followed Moore's trail and apparently has a number of sources. Two of the names he gave me apparently belong to this New Science Advocates group. One is a NSC guard at Sandia named Ronald Blackburn another is Dr. Henry Monteath. I will wait to see what Steinman provides me on these people.

William Moore was separated from his wife while living in Prescott, Arizona. Moore had planned to go home to Arizona to see his children. Steinman phoned hoping Moore would be there and talked to Moore's first wife. Moore wasn't there yet. When Steinman said Bill said he was going to be there Moore's wife stated "Bill says alot of things". Moore's wife also stated "Bill's into alot of things he shouldn't be into".

Steinman stated he had talked to Tuve's brother who stated Tuve had been involved in a number of Top Secret Projects with V. Bush. I doubt these records will be at the Carnegie Institute as claimed by Steinman.

I plan to phone Steinman in the next few days and will provide a transcript. Steinman is in my opinion very close to understanding how this whole thing fits together.

Transcript of Cameron-Steinman interview December 28, 1988.
Many of Cameron's statements are pulled as they simply state
what the investigation team is doing. The Steinman sections
are verbatim.

Cameron states he has just interviewed Bob Pratt.

S: Ya, I wrote to Bob a few times.

C: What did he tell you about the book?

S: I asked him for a copy of the manuscript, and he acted
real vague about it like he didn't have a copy to send me.

C: He tells the whole story and this just about does Moore
in.

S: William Moore or Alvin Moore?

C: Bill Moore

S: Oh okay

C: He mentions a third writer, and the name that he used was
Ronald L. Davies have you ever heard of it?

S: I've heard the name Davies used before in literature. Is
that Moore's pseudonym?

C: Pratt doesn't know who it is.

S: (referring to the book) It was fiction, is that what it
was?

C: It was fiction.

S: Is this in writing or just over the telephone?

C: Just over the telephone. I taped it. I'll send you a
transcript.

S: How long ago did they write this?

C: (states he doesn't know for sure, have to check the
transcripts) Somewhere around '81 or '82. I'll send the
copy.

S: Ya, I'd like to hear that.

C: Do you know who Loren E. Gross is?

S: No I don't know that name, never heard it before. I was
wondering where you got the name.

C: Do you get "Focus"?

S: No, but I got a copy of the article because someone I
know sent me a copy of "Focus". One of the guys that I
correspond with and talk on the phone with from Riverside
California. He sends it to me periodically. I did have that
one on the Robertson panel by Gross. I didn't know who the
guy was. (Gross)

C: Have you seen Ruppelt's files?

S: No I don't have access to Ruppelt's files but I can look
up those two guys if they're in Long Beach, California.

C: (I'd like to talk to Gross but he writes for Moore and I
don't have anything to do with Moore)

S: I'd could go to Lee Graham and ask Graham because he
confides information in me. He's pretty close to Moore. He
might know who Gross is. That's one thing, usually when I
want to know something about what Moore's holding back from
me I'll go to Graham and talk to him.

C: Have you seen Moore's FBI file?

S: Ya, I don't know if Moore blacked out most of that stuff because it was personal. A lot of times he'll black out stuff himself.

C: (tells Steinman that of three letters sent by Chris Rotkowski and two letter by Cameron to Stanton Friedman the only question Friedman replied to was in a Christmas card to Chris. He stated he had asked for his FBI file but had been denied access, even to the point of not being told how many pages were involved.)

S: I noticed that Friedman, Moore, and Shandera act very standoffish when it comes to things like that. Very secretive.

C: Can you go through the New Science Advocate stuff again?

S: Let me get my little phone book. I've got it all in there, the last address I had. All I know about the group is that a lot of the guys at Sandia were members of the group. I know that.

C: They had published papers? Who told you that?

S: They've got books and papers all kinds of stuff on them. Here it is Ronald Satz, 4010 North War Memorial Drive, 1008 Peoria, Illinois 61614. I wrote a letter to the group and they sent me a thing back "no longer at that address". That's all I had. I got that address from . . . no I got that from colonel Ronald Blackburn a guy who was a National Security Agent guard at Sandia Labs.

C: And he was a member of this group?

S: He was a member also.

C: You mention this Monteath guy. Pratt said he had talked to him. Is he pretty open?

S: Ya. Monteath is open about certain things and he's very closed when it comes to sensitive areas. He's involved in a lot of very sensitive projects for the US government. He doesn't talk about those at all.

C: But this group he would talk about?

S: He hadn't talked that much about it he just said he was a member. From what Blackburn told me New Science Advocate more or less stemmed out of Wilbert B. Smith's work.

C: (Cameron asks about Friedman's first call to Walker and that Walker had made some sort of derogatory statements about UFOs)

S: Friedman suspected that Walker knew something about it. He poked fun at UFOs to him on the phone.

C: He didn't go into what exactly he had said eh?

S: No. He was just suspicious that Walker knew more than what he was letting on. (Steinman states he will send a copy of the Friedman-Steinman letter describing this)

C: (Cameron makes reference to the former NYT's reporter working on the cover up as reported by Jerome Clark)

S: One thing. Do you know Clark's relationship to this whole thing? I found out that Clark and Moore are close. Very close.

C: (relates to Steinman correspondence with Clark, trying to get Clark to clear up the confusion about the two

Presidential briefing documents. One describes the live alien and the MJ-12 document leaves it out.)

S: Speaking of live aliens . . . I got a letter out of Frank Scully's own files that someone had written to him and mentioned that they had met an Intelligence Officer that worked at Los Alamos who worked on a project that had a live alien taken from a saucer and the letter was written in 1951.

C: Is that right eh?

S: That's the earliest piece of information I have of anybody talking about a live alien I can make a copy of that letter and send it. It's about six pages type written long. The guy said that his daughter met the guy and was pretty sweet on the guy and they were going together for awhile and this guy was an Intelligence Officer at Los Alamos and he related some of this information to her in private and she related it to her father and uh because her father said something was bothering her all this time and finally he got it out of her what it was and she didn't know how to handle the information the guy had given her . . . that was a live alien taken out of a craft. He didn't specify what craft it was taken out of or whatever but they had it at Los Alamos and that goes along with what everybody else (has said).

C: You didn't find any correspondence between Scully and Smith?

S: No. No correspondence between Scully and Smith. Most of the correspondence I had was between Scully and George Kroellers, Scully and uh and uh Silas Newton, and Scully and other people who had read his book and written to him. I was trying to go through his files and I was pressed for time. It was January of this year. Alice Scully was cleaning out her garage and she called me over to come and look at it. I got there at noon and I had about three hours to look at it before the library closed. I took a bunch of the stuff down to the library and copied it. Got back and uh I don't think I got half of what I should have got. She was sending it off to . . . listen to this . . . the University of Wyoming. That's where Leon Sprinkle is. They have it there she (Alice Scully) said they're trying to organize it now. She's getting letters back and forth between the library . . . she shipped it off UPS to the University of Wyoming library.

C: Who all knows about this?

S: Just myself and I think Linda Howe knows about it and a few others I've talked to know that they have it there at the library.

C: . . . There's quite a bit of information there?

S: There's four boxes all packed together of notes and stuff and she says she still has letter files at home she's going through now that she didn't let loose. She's got a whole filing cabinet full of letters this was just stuff that was crammed into cardboard boxes.

C: (Cameron relates the fact that there are a number of files including the Smith files where good material can be found.)

S: (He relates he got the Smith-Cox letters from Moore) when Moore and I were working together back in 1982. That . . . that's the very year Moore and I split our ways. It was about early '83, we were seeing each other quite a bit early in '82 and I had a feeling that he was using me and he wanted me to work with him on a "Scully was hoax" story. He wanted to put it out through "Fate" magazine through Jerome Clark and I said no I didn't want to do that because there were too many things pointing towards [the fact] that the story wasn't a hoax. And right away we, more or less, parted our ways after that. But he stuck to me like glue there for awhile. All through '82 he was close to me. He phoned me on the phone almost every other day.

C: That's strange. And he broke it off or did you break it off?

S: Well it broke off when we were at a Bob's Big Boy restaurant here at the local area around here discussing things and he dropped a name on me . . . Gilbert Jacobus . . . and uh it was about uh this Col. Jacobus he was at some retirement party for Admiral Rickover and somebody mentioned UFOs at the table that they were sitting at and a guy winked his eye and looked at Gilbert Jacobus and said "we know all about those don't we Gil? We know the truth behind the flying saucers." Gilbert says yep and he shut up right away after that. And he (Moore) gave the name Gilbert Jacobus. Naturally I looked up the name Gilbert Jacobus, found out who he was, got his name, address, telephone number called him up and talked to him and he very mom on the subject matter, in fact he got to the point where he told me I was crazy to be involved in it. When somebody says that you know they know something and they want you to stay away. He said that . . . he shouted that to me on the phone and he didn't know me from Adam. And so I knew he must have been involved in something and he didn't want anyone knowing he was involved. And so I called Moore and told him that I had contacted Jacobus and Bill Moore read me the riot act. He told me "you were not to contact Gilbert Jacobus. You broke a trust." And I said there was no trust Bill, you dropped a name and I looked it up and nobody said a thing about not trying to contact him and he was really mad at me and shouted to me on the phone and so I hung up the phone on Bill Moore and we didn't talk for several months later. I went off on vacation and he sent me two great big letters type written letters telling me he was gonna spread my name and slander me all over the place if I didn't apologize and this kind of stuff. And I got copies of those letters still and I told him there was no reason for me to apologize and all kinds of things he was going to spread about me. And I said go ahead and do it Bill. I don't care. And he never did but he was really upset and we parted our ways altogether. I didn't contact him for a year after that. I hit a touchy subject with him there. When I looked into that Gilbert thing I said what is there Bill? Does Gilbert have something on you or do you have something on him or is he one of the

key figures in the whole issue or are you working with him or what? And he didn't say we just parted our ways after that. . . . Moore's a very mysterious person, a very suspicious person and he's a very hard person to work with if you're ever going to work with him. I found that out. Usually he's working with you for a purpose. And he's using you for a purpose.

C: (Pratt had stated Moore was claiming Schuessler was working for the CIA)

S: Ya, somebody else mentioned that. I often wondered how Schuessler was coming along with that Cash/Landrum. He got into that deeper than anybody else. Schuessler lives down in Houston, Texas doesn't he?

C: Ya, Pratt mentioned another name uh . . . John Warren. Ever talk to him at Sandia?

S: I heard the name Warren but I never contacted the name.

C: He used to be on the Blue ribbon Panel for the National Enquirer. Pratt said he was kind of a mysterious fellow. . .

S: One guy that works there at Sandia his name is Gerry Miller. Gerald D. Miller they call him Gerry Miller. He was in a uh . . . Faucett and Greenwood's book in the investigation (He means to say documents in book related to the Kirkland AFB case) and I called up and contacted Miller and he still works as a civilian consultant, special consultant to the Air Force Office of Technology at Kirkland AFB. Everybody says, quite a few people say that he knows quite a bit. And he was considered in that document as one of the governments foremost experts on UFOs and so I've talked to him several times. I've been talking to him on a kind of friendly type basis trying to draw out of him what he actually does know. He's very vague about certain areas when he come out about it and he said he was going to purchase a copy of my book and read it and he would give me comments on it. But I haven't had any comments yet. Evidently, he hasn't purchased a copy yet. I noticed several guys at Sandia had purchased my book and read it and uh made comments on it and I just got a letter . . . do you know Dr. B. Schwartz . . . he lives down in Vero Beach he's the one who wrote the two volume set UFO Dynamics. He wrote me a letter it just came in the mail yesterday and Schwartz says that he and his wife were at the international convention on cyclotronics and he says he met a uh . . . he wouldn't tell who it was . . . it was an old friend of his who was ah . . . circulated in high government circles who was a person who was respected, high ranking in government circles and he said the person read my book and spoke well of it. What ever he meant by that. That's all he said. I'm going to write him a letter or call him and ask him who the guy was. Maybe he'll give me the name in confidence. Maybe get the guy in touch with me. I'd like to hear more from the guy and see what his relationship to all this was. I expect it's Kissinger. The way he talked about the guy it almost seemed like it was Kissinger. I'd like to know for sure. Ya know?

C: You've got some good comments on your book?

S: Ya, I got some thirty-six odd letters from people who have read the book. Some of them are from University Professors. Some of them are from Military Personnel. One guy was chairman of the board of some banking corporation who read it. People like that who are in high places. They enjoy the subject matter so they enjoy the book. I often wondered what prompted them to write me on the subject unless they know something more. One of them was from University of California. I found out two key organizations or names that tie in with alot of these names . . . high ranking personnel who are on the Research and Development Board, people who's names Sarbacher mentioned and beyond. The Cosmos Club (Washington D.C.) is one of them. Walker's a member of the Cosmos Club. Bush is a member of the Cosmos Club. Another one is the Radiation Laboratory (U of Cal.)

C: (Brings up the subject of what some researchers might know about Moore. Suggests maybe Greenwood)

S: He does. Greenwood does have a few things to say. And the one who is closest to him of all is Lee Graham. He knows certain things about him but he's not telling anybody as if he's afraid of ruining his delicate relationship with Moore. He has established to get information for himself. . . Lee Graham has still been filing FOIAs different things like that.

C: He hasn't got any breakthroughs or anything like that lately.

S: Not anything major.

C: Okay good to talk to you again. We'll talk again later.

S: Okay, talk to ya later.
