The following information concerning Air Force investigations of unusual aerial phenomena is submitted in answer to your request.

In the Fall of 1947 the United States Air Force began an official study of the flying saucer phenomenon. It was not until 1948 that the public was informed that the problem might be related to the Air Force responsibility for the air defense of the United States.

On December 27, 1949, the Air Force announced that the Air Force Command, which was then the Air Force Headquarters, had been organized to study and evaluate all available facts concerning flying saucer sightings.

On December 27, 1949, after 375 reported sightings had been investigated, the Air Force, with the concurrence of the Army and the Navy, announced the findings of the flying saucer project.

The Air Force has concluded that the majority of the reports of unidentified flying objects could be accounted for as misinterpretations of known phenomena, such as aircraft, balloons, or other objects.

To date, the Air Force has undertaken to investigate and analyze about 1,000 reports of sightings of unidentified flying objects. These reports were classified and divided into several categories: meteorological phenomena, astronomical phenomena, light phenomena, sound, and other phenomena. The Air Force has been able to identify the cause of about 80 percent of the sightings.

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Although many instruments which are useful in obtaining more accurate data of this type have been available, the reports based on sightings with these instruments have been less reliable than those based on sightings with the naked eye. However, even these reports have not included much of the information required.

Because of the inadequacy of this basic data, the Air Force has in the past been unable to identify the cause of about 20 percent of the sightings.
