

X The Condon Report stated definitely that there was no evidence to assume UFOs were intelligently controlled space vehicles from other worlds and therefore they were no threat to United States security, *despite the fact that the Committee was unable to explain 10% of the well-documented sightings they investigated.*

"Let us not be misled by the Condon-Committee Report," said Commander Bray in a 99-page plea before the Canadian Senate's Special Committee on Science Policy.

Bray, who was then (February 1969) still active in the Royal Canadian Navy, told the Senators: "There can be no doubt about the existence of UFOs. The question is: what are they? Why are they here, what are they doing?"

Bray, 46, recently told The ENQUIRER in ^aOttawa: "What I said to the Senators then still stands. The need for an investigation of UFOs along the lines I suggested more than two years ago is just as great today."

His suggestion was that the United Nations coordinate an international probe of UFOs among all its member nations, he said.

X "I have asked the United Nations Organization for such an investigation and was told by Secretary ^{General}U Thant's office that it could be undertaken if one member nation placed it on the agenda and it was passed by the General Assembly," said Bray.

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
