Dear Dr. Millman:

This letter is to confirm our discussion in your office on Wednesday, August 27th, 1969, on the subject of UFOs.

On that date, I deposited with you a piece of metal of unknown origin, weighing approximately fifteen pounds, and you agreed to arrange scientific laboratory analysis to determine the nature and origin of this metal.

The metal fragment concerned is from a large piece estimated to weigh three thousand pounds found in the Province of Quebec a number of years ago under rather unusual circumstances. This metal has been the object of much controversy over the years as to whether it is of extraterrestrial origin. Numerous tests conducted to date have failed to positively identify this metal and this, of course, has kindled the fires of speculation. It would seem, however, that such failures would suggest that there must be something unusual about the metal, otherwise it would presumably not be difficult to determine its composition and probable origin.

My interest is simply to settle this matter once and for all. I think it is time a thorough analysis of a very comprehensive nature was conducted to finally establish the nature of this metal, and determine whether it is of terrestrial or extraterrestrial origin, without simply opinions, but clear scientific proof. If it is of terrestrial origin, I would appreciate being informed as to where and how it originated. Should it be of no known terrestrial
