

illegal interference in domestic affairs had anything to do with his change in title.

The February 19th letter confirmed that Tab B, which is listed in the Report's Index as a "List of Personnel Concerned with Meetings", could not be declassified. However, he sent what he stated was a sanitized version of Tab B. Strangely though, the Tab B sent by Mr. Young turned out to be a brief list of the evidence presented to the Panel during their eight meetings. This "List of Documentary Evidence Presented" is available in toto in the sanitized version as "Tab C".

Seemingly unaware of this contradiction, Mr. Young further stated that Tab C was still under review, that is, still classified "Secret Security Information". He wrote that he would notify promptly of the results of that review.

On March 28th, 1975 the CIA ostensibly declassified the elusive Tab C. This Tab, received early in April, turned out to be a "List of Personnel Concerned with the Meetings". Though this declassified knowledge is valuable in itself, it is not the Tab C mentioned in the body of the Robertson Report. Tab C is supposed to be the "final report" (conclusions) of the Panel, differing in what ways we do not know with the milder conclusions known and declassified as Tab A.
