

Lieutenant Ruppelt advised that some of the factual information appearing in the recent Life article was supplied by ATIC. However, the conclusions were certainly not those of ATIC. He further advises that there will be an article explaining Flying Saucers in Look Magazine, June 17th edition, as nothing but mirages due to a natural phenomenon (inversion).

At present ATIC have an agreement with Air Defence Command for the 24 hour operation of their scope cameras. There is also a possibility that they will try to have provided cheaply a camera with a diffraction grating over the lens. With this type of camera it would be possible to eliminate meteors and s/c by studying the spectrum produced. If this camera can be supplied, it is intended that from 100 - 200 of them will be placed in the Arizona and New Mexico.

ATIC publish a monthly status report which lists all sightings of the previous month. It is desirable that this report and other Flying saucer data be made available to Canadian Intelligence and that all Canadian reports be made available to ATIC. From conversations with Colonel Dunn and Lt. Col. Taylor, Commanding Officer and Deputy Commanding Officer respectively of ATIC, it is felt that a close liaison between ATIC and Canadian Intelligence on Flying Saucer projects would be most welcome. It is suggested that a direct channel of communication be established between ATIC and DAT for the exchange of flying saucer data and that a letter be written to ATIC inviting Lt. E. Ruppelt to visit Canada next month.
