I. "Project SKYLIGHT"

A report on the findings and proceedings of the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena.

A monthly scientific journal containing not only a record of meetings and matters of interest to the membership but also statistics and summaries of important investigations conducted by the Committee. This publication may contain authoritative technical and other articles on the subject of space flight and the progress being made in the United States and in various countries of the world.

Copies of "Project SKYLIGHT" are sent to all members. They are not otherwise available to the general public.

II. "SPACE FLIGHT"

A popular monthly magazine of high quality, containing authoritative semi-technical articles of general interest, photographs in color, and selected science fiction. Edited by the Committee's Publications Section and policy rigorously controlled. Available on newsstands and by subscription.

The actual publishing of "SPACE FLIGHT" shall be carried on outside the Committee's immediate facilities through an exclusive license or copyright agreement. It is believed that this publication, if properly managed, could provide a substantial source of income.

INITIAL ORGANIZATION COMMITTEE

Five in number, representing the following basic fields of interest:

Legal
Financial
Public Relations
Scientific
Government Liaison

(Who served until corporation was formed)

INCORPORATORS

Three in number, comprising the attorney for the new corporation, representing legal interest in the Initial Organization Committee, and two other members of that committee.

CODE OF REGULATIONS

As suggested by corporation counsel and approved by the Initial Organization Committee.

PROVISIONS OF THE CHARTER

The following specific activities are proposed as defining and legally circumscribing the objectives of the organization:

- 1) To investigate, classify, index and correlate worldwide observations of aerial or atmospheric phenomena.
- 2) To serve as a national clearing house and library in the examination, validation and registration of visual sightings and radar contacts of unidentified flying objects.
- 3) To conduct physical and chemical analyses of materials taken as evidence in connection with the above and perform such other tests, inspections, studies or inquiries as may be required to establish the accuracy and/or authenticity of such evidence.
- 4) To assist and counsel associations, local clubs and groups studying atmospheric or extraterrestrial phenomena for the purpose of more effective coverage and general understanding of the subject and for the promotion of better public relations.
- 5) To serve as a representative committee in promoting the national and public interests of local groups and as liaison in matters concerning the Government of the United States.
