

2. We see no military significance to reported UFOs.
3. We are not conducting any specific actions other than monitoring reports.
4. We do not have any information concerning the origin of UFOs.

It should be noted that the only important aspect of this reply is that the existence of UFOs has not been denied. That, in itself, is significant.

The answers to questions 2 and 3 can hardly be truthful, considering the documented evidence I presented in my brief.

What is my next step now? I have yet to decide this. There are several alternatives open to me.

I hope the presentation of this exercise helps to demonstrate that it is as difficult to get satisfactory answers from the Canadian government, as it is in the U.S.A.

In Canada, we have just had a Canadian equivalent of your Freedom of Information Act passed into law (as of July 1, 1983). It is called the "Access to Information Act". Please note the absence of the word "freedom". Let me assure you it will not be easy to obtain UFO information, just as it is not easy in the U.S.A. One must know what one wants, and which department of government has it. Then there are plenty of exceptions where you can't get the information released anyway. It will be interesting to see if anyone in Canada can succeed in obtaining any significant UFO data under the provisions of this legislation.
