Dear Mr. Hoover:

This letter is in reference to my communication to you of June 26, 1956 and of August 2, 1956 regarding a conspiracy to silence George Adamski involving the F.B.I.

You will find enclosed my documentary report, "Expose" of the Silence Group for your consideration. This report will soon be made public as a part of my book now in the hands of my New York publisher. In this book, AIR FORCE EVIDENCE CONFIRMS ADAMSKI STORY, it is my intention to present the views of all sides of this controversy. For instance, I have attacked the exposes of Adamski by James W. Moseley, editor of SAUCER NEWS, and Mr. Lonzo Dove. However, it is not my policy to attack others without allowing them space to reply. Only when the public is allowed to read both sides is it possible to find the truth. I feel that neither side will tell the whole truth but between the conflicting viewpoints lies the truth. This is why I present both sides and leave it up to the reader to separate fiction from fact.

In the enclosed report I make an attack upon the F.B.I. and so I am going to give you an opportunity to reply. In this report I make the following points:

1. That in answer to my letter to you of June 26, 1956 your secretary, Helen W. Gandy, gave me false and misleading information and tried to dodge my inquiry.
2. That in answer to my letter of August 2, 1956 to you that you sent two agents to my home to lie about Adamski and falsely discredit an innocent man by claiming that he made statements that he never made as proven by a transcript of the tape recording of the radio interview in question, and that he was falsely accused of a crime by your agents who are guilty of hoaxing me.
3. That the F.B.I. took part in a conspiracy to intimidate and silence George Adamski on December 17, 1953.

As you will note in reading my report, Mr. Adamski actually praised your organization and then your agents turn around and thank him by lying about him and trying to make trouble. In a way this shows that one should not praise your organization but attack it, for it may oddly enough command more respect from what I consider incompetent and big-headed personnel.

You had your agent, Mr. Willis, tell me that I could investigate flying saucers all I wanted to but to leave the F.B.I. and that I should forget this story. This is a laugh and illustrates clearly your childish attitude. If you were intelligent, you would have had your agents give me the impression that you didn't care whether I investigated the F.B.I. or not or this story. I would have probably dropped the story figuring there was nothing to it. But when I am told that the F.B.I. doesn't want to be investigated, this is enough to cause anyone to become suspicious enough to investigate further. You apparently are too ignorant to know how to use common psychology to achieve your goals. You and your men should take a few lessons from Mr. Dulles, director of the C.I.A. As my enclosed reports shows, I contacted him about this and I found him to be far more intelligent than you and your organization. Mr. Dulles is a smooth and efficient operator. He doesn't have Mr. Earman telling me to leave the F.B.I. out of my investigations or to forget anything but even thanks me for my inquiry. Now this man
