UNIDENTIFIED AERIAL OBJECTS--PROJECT "SIGN" (1949, 46 pages)

The first comprehensive report prepared by "Project Sign," initiated by the Technical Intelligence Division, Air Materiel Command in 1948, it is a progress report of the U.S. Air Force study of UFOs. Originally classified "Secret," it includes a discussion of "Considerations Affecting Analysis and Evaluation," especially methods of propulsion. The appendices contain graphs of object sightings by shape and dates, "Some Considerations Affecting the Interpretation of Reports of Unidentified Flying Objects" by G.E. Valley, a member of the Scientific Advisory Board to the Chief of Staff, USAF, and a letter from J.E. Lipp of the Rand Corp. regarding possible places of origin of UFOs.

PROJECT "SAUCER" (1949, 22 pages)

This is the press release issued by the USAF in response to demands for details of Project SIGN. It summarizes the sightings of the period 1947-1949, and includes discussions of the Arnold, Mantell, Chiles-Whitted and Gorman sightings, as well as astronomical, balloon and hoax reports.

A Transcription of a CONFERENCE ON AERIAL PHENOMENA held on 16 Feb. 1949 at Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, Los Alamos, New Mexico. 24 pages

This conference was held to consider the many reports of green fireballs seen in Texas and New Mexico over several months just previous to the conference and the differences between these accounts and those of meteorite falls. These unexplainable reports were what led to the establishment of Project "Twinkle." Included also is a four-page summary of the conference by another writer.

PROJECT "TWINKLE" FINAL REPORT, by L. Elterman. (1951, 28 pages)

A report of an attempt by the U.S.A.F. to concentrate some of its resources for observing UFOs into two locations for a limited time. The instrumentation was never completed as planned and the results were essentially negative, although summaries of nine sightings and a more detailed analysis of one are included. Some relevant correspondence is attached.

PROJECT "BLUE BOOK" SPECIAL REPORT No. 14--Analysis of Reports of Unidentified Aerial Objects. Released May, 1955 by Air Technical Intelligence Center, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. (This edition, 110 pages)

Accompanied by a 17-page analysis and historical introduction by Dr. Bruce Maccabee.

FLYING SAUCERS: A MODERN MYTH OF THINGS SEEN IN THE SKY, by Carl G. Jung. (1979, 138 pages) (original edition was 1959)

A description of unconscious archetypal symbolism and how it relates to the self and to reports of UFOs, allowing both for the possibility of objective reality and for subconscious internal origin of UFOs. He compares treatment of round psychologically-integrating symbols in dreams, paintings and fiction and also in UFO reports. An excellent chapter on "UFOs Considered in a Non-psychological Light" outlines alternative hypotheses for the puzzling reports of UFOs.

CLOSE ENCOUNTERS: A FACTUAL REPORT ON UFOs by Sherman J. Larsen (1978, 94 pages)

22 Written for readers aged nine and up, this book fills a long-felt gap in UFO literature. It describes the different kinds of UFOs and relates specific sightings, with many colored graphs, photos, and sketches.

UFOLOGY: A Major Breakthrough in the Scientific Understanding of Unidentified Flying Objects, by James M. McCampbell (1973, 184 pages)

23 Drawing on hundreds of reports of UFO sightings (with sources cited), McCampbell takes an analytical approach under the working hypothesis that UFOs are mechanical constructions that behave according to the witnesses' accounts. He looks at the data according to reliability, types of vehicles reported, sounds, electrical interference, physiological effects, flight and propulsion, pilots and passengers, and activities on earth. He concludes with an appraisal of his hypothesis and a program for research.

UFO OCCUPANTS AND CRITTERS, by John Brent Musgrave (1979, 46 pages)

While the author was doing research into the social history of the UFO phenomenon in Canada (supported by a grant from the Canadian Council) he found many more reports of UFOs than he had known existed. He presents here, briefly, a catalog of 89 of those incidents, with sources. His well-informed speculation about the phenomena is interesting also.

UFOs: GOD'S CHARIOTS? by Ted Peters (1977, 192 pages)

A thoughtful and well-informed examination of how we understand UFOs, in terms of the model of politics, science and religion. Peters, a minister and professor of religious studies, asks the question of whether a Christian god is using UFOs for a message to mankind, and concludes that God has better and more direct ways to communicate with people. Very interesting analysis.
