Moore-Cameron Nov.30,1989

Cameron: Are you following the African crash story?

Moore: Ya.

Cameron: And what is your conclusion?

Moore: I don't have any conclusion.

Cameron: Your getting your stuff thro' Azehdedel?

Moore: No. I'm not.

Cameron: You have a different source?

Moore: Ya.

Cameron: There is a claim of briefing documents. Do you have these?

Moore: Ya.

Cameron: There is a story of an electromagnetic pulse weapon. Have you heard this?

Moore: It's described as a particle beam-lasar weapon.

Cameron: Azed. is making all sorts of claims as to what he has. The other story that I wanted to see if your following is this story in Vegas. The story deals with Robert Lazar who claims to have worked at Dreamland?

Moore: Ya, but I'm not impressed as I can't verify Lazar as being who he claims to be.

Cameron: Have you talked to Knapp? I tried to contact him as to how he tried to verify this guy?

Moore: I don't know but I know his claims are pretty extravagant, and they just don't seem to click with some of the things that I know to be so. I'm very sceptical right now. I know that Lear was involved with the guy for a while. I don't know. I'm prepared to leave room for it, but the checking that I've done doesn't confirm the claims that the guy is making about who he is.

Cameron: One more item. I was talking to Tom, and he mentioned, I guess at your conversation with him at the conference - that you had come up with Kissinger before Steinman.

Moore: I mentioned Kissinger to Steinman for crying out loud.

Cameron: OK. What did you base this on?

Moore: Because of what's her name over there in New Mexico?

Cameron: Wang?

Moore: Ya. Because she had mentioned him. Because when I started checking on her story his name came up. It may only have been that Kissinger and Wang were friends, I don't know. A part that bothered me about this story is why they would have this type of weapon in South Africa. If this is the top technology, this would seem like a pretty unstable place to keep it.

Moore: It certainly does, especially mounted on a fighter. A Mirage. I do have the name of the weapon. That name does at least appear to be a bonified name. There does seem to be such a weapon, or at least such a project. I should have a considerably clearer picture on it next week. I'm going to go off in the next couple of days, and talk to the source that has been keeping me posted on it. He has a direct connection to Germany.

Cameron: And this South African intelligence officer that's running across Europe - you're aware of him?

Moore: I'm aware of him. I don't have any direct contacts with him. He's a Major or something.

Cameron: The claim thro' Azehdedel is that this guy spent two weeks with him, and that Henry put him into hiding.

Moore: Well. I hadn't heard that Henry has spent time with him. I don't know. It may be an interesting story. unless it's another Bennewitz. We'll just have to wait and see. I should have a better position on that some time next week. Also I should know something more about Dr. W.
