

Books about UFOs are quite varied. For a general approach to the subject, read 17, 18, 8, 36, 37 or 10, although almost any of the books listed below would have one or more general chapters. Analytical approaches can be found in 12, 15, 23, 28, 36 and 37. Straight reference works are 7, 29, 30 and 33. For history of the phenomenon, try 8, 20, or 33 and 30. These, 6, 9, 14 and 32, have detailed accounts of one or more incidents. No. 22 has been written especially for younger readers. Other aspects treated in these books should emerge from their descriptions.

THE ROSWELL INCIDENT by Charles Berlitz and William L. Moore (1979, 168 pages)

1 First-hand descriptions of still-living witnesses of strange debris found in 1947 of something that had apparently crashed on a ranch near Roswell, N.M., and indirect reports that the object had contained burned bodies of small beings. Other reports refer to a denial of the incident by the U.S. government.

UFO SIGHTINGS, LANDINGS AND ABDUCTIONS--THE DOCUMENTED EVIDENCE by Yurko Bondarchuk (1979, 208 pages)

A compilation and analysis of many Canadian UFO sightings with emphasis on photos, physical traces and reactions, sightings by military pilots and those seen near military installations. Bondarchuk describes electromagnetic effects and power black-outs possibly related to UFO sightings, and ends with an excellent section on "the Canadian government and UFOs." A strong leaning toward the extraterrestrial hypothesis is evident throughout the book.

THE UFO CONNECTION by Arthur Bray (1979, 190 pages)

After describing several Canadian UFO sightings, some of them well-known, Bray discusses the UFO phenomenon in the context of other paranormal phenomena as well as the concept of a "parallel universe." He reviews Canadian government's role in accumulating and holding UFO data in its files and includes his testimony before the Canadian Senate's Special Committee of Science Policy. By special arrangement, he prints the interim and the full reports of "Project Magnet," the Canadian government's UFO study.

BEYOND THE FOUR DIMENSIONS: Reconciling Physics, Parapsychology and UFOs, by Karl Brunstein (1979, 222 pages)

4 An intellectually plausible explanation of the UFO phenomenon appears in this book. A physicist and authority on cosmic radiation, Dr. Brunstein goes past the current limits of science to hypothesize a fifth dimension--beyond height, width, depth and the function of time--as the source of UFO sightings. Before presenting this theory the author provides and accurate and interesting review of the history of astronomy, biological evolution and some of the philosophical and other complexities of modern physics.

MUFON FIELD INVESTIGATOR'S MANUAL, Ray Fowler, Ed. (Second edition, 1975, 132 pages)

How to establish a reporting network, assemble a field-investigator's kit, and investigate general and specialized types of UFO sightings (physical traces, reports of entities, photographic evidence, etc.). Star maps and a Bright Planet Location Chart are included.

COLOR CHIPS, from Zipatone

A set of 142 1" by 3" numbered color samples of translucent plastic that can be held up to the light for comparison with the sight or memory of a UFO. A black cardboard viewing frame is included, and a white cardboard background.

"JUPITERSCOPE"--A way to analyze the light of a UFO sighting.

A holographic diffraction grating on a flexible plastic disc, 48 mm. in diameter, this can be used with the eye, binoculars or camera to observe a spectrum* from any light source. It allows the perception of both continuous spectra, from man-made sources of light, and the possibility of capturing a discontinuous spectrum from any other source--hence its potential as a UFO light-analyzer.

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SOIL SAMPLER

A lightweight device consisting of a footlong tube with one saw-toothed cutting end, a cross handle at the other (making a T) and one side cut away for easier viewing and removing of soil. It may be used horizontally or vertically to a depth of about 12 inches, and is small enough to go into a briefcase.

SAMPLING BAGS

These heavyweight plastic bags (4 mil.) with a zipper lock are suitable for samples of dry substances like soil. (Be sure to use for both affected soils and for control samples to cancel out any contaminant from the plastic.)

POCKET PENETROMETER, Model CL-700

This is used for classification of soils or for determining pressure per square foot previously applied to soils. It is useful for studying imprints sometimes found in soil following the sighting of a UFO near the ground.
