In compliance with letter, Department of the Army, GSUSA, CSGID 452, dated 25 March 1948, subject: Unconventional Aircraft, control number A-1917, the following information is hereby submitted.

"Farmer Tells of Watching C-54 Launch Flying Saucer
Dowagiac, Mich., July 6—A 'young, hardworking farmer not given to seeing things' has reported watching a flying saucer launched from an Army C-54.

"John Keller made the report to the Dowagiac newspaper, and said his two young sons would verify his statements.

"Keller said he watched a saucer shaped like an automobile hub cap, about 25 feet in diameter and 12 to 15 feet thick, launched from a low-flying Army C-54 on June 29.

"Keller said the launching took place about a quarter of a mile from where he was riding a tractor, in a hay field.

'The plane was heading southwest at a low rate of speed, about 300 feet up, when the saucer came from the belly of the plane,' he declared. 'It sort of wobbled, then shot away at a terrific speed, due south. It easily outdistanced the C-54 and was out of sight in five seconds.'

"It looked like a gigantic hub cap or half of a sphere. It's topside looked like chrome and had a little dome protruding, and the bottom was dull grey. 'I didn't report it sooner because I was afraid my neighbors might give me the horse laugh.' Keller was with his young sons, Larry and Johnny, when he saw 'the launching.'"

Flying saucer reported seen by: Dr. L. G. Vatter, 8937 S. Morgan
Chicago 19, Illinois at 0109, 1 July 1950.

"Flying from N to S at terrific rate of speed. Covered distance
from N horizon to S horizon in 2 seconds.

"Description: Round, intensely bright, soundless. Not a meteor.
Dr. claims he has seen meteors and knows what they look like.
This object, like a ball of fire, the Dr. claims, was at a high
altitude and traveled a horizontal course over West Chicago."

2. No further investigation is contemplated by this headquarters.
