SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

On 29 April 1952, S/A Joel L. Carr received a telephone call from Mrs. [REDACTED], housewife, [REDACTED] Homewood, Illinois, telephone: Homewood 2252-W. Source stated that at approximately 1700 hours, 28 April 1952, she and Mrs. Walter Westernan, same address, had observed an unusual object in the sky, distance and altitude unknown, southeast of their observation point at 2855 West 183rd Street, Homewood. The object, resembling a white parachute, was apparently circling a large airplane (description of which could not be given) silver in color, which was traveling southeast at the same altitude as the object. The object and plane were observed for approximately three (3) minutes, when they disappeared from view.
