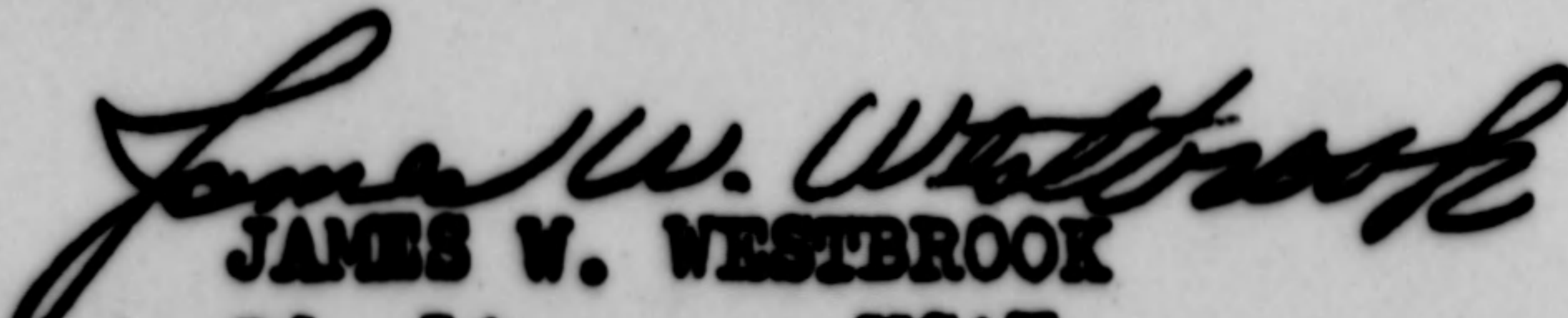
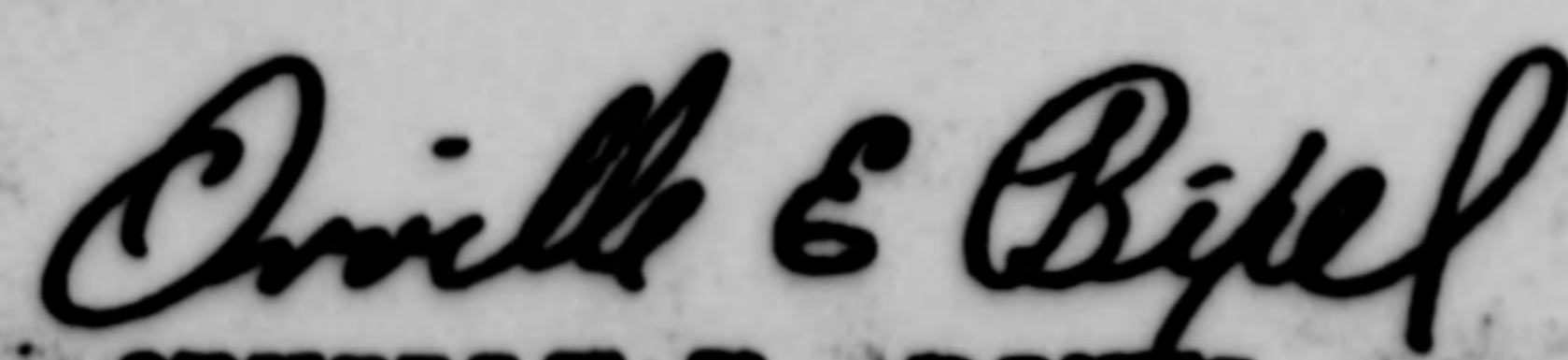

Begin text of report on AF Form 112—Part II.) 0935Z An unidentified object was observed visually at 0235 Pacific Daylight Time for approximately one minute, 2 August 1952. It was described as a very bright light, three times as bright as a star. The object was not moving. The observer stated that it could not be a light on a building. The altitude was estimated only as very high. The observer was located at California and Powell Street in San Francisco, California. The object was to the northwest of the observer at an 85° angle. The observer's name is Miss Marguerite Colvin, 215 Cole Street, San Francisco. She stated that the stars and moon were not showing because of a high fog layer. The weather officer reported winds at 10,000 feet were 160° at 9 knots; at 20,000 feet winds were at 200° at 23 knots. Meteorological activity, physical evidence of the sighting, identification action taken and aircraft in the area were reported as negative. <u>Comments of Preparing Officer:</u> 1.
