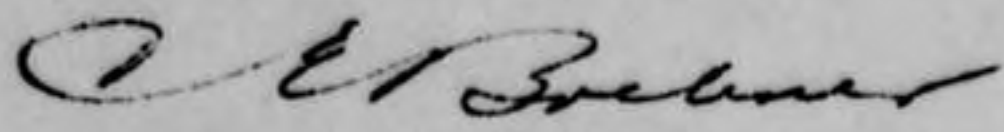

1. Reference letter your Headquarters, AG 350.09 AKADB-I, dated 2 February 1951, Subject: Intelligence Activities.

2. In compliance with par 6a(5), above referenced letter, the following report concerning sighting of unidentified aerial object is forwarded for your information:

a. Date and Time Observed: 1618 hours, 26 October 1952.

b. Location: US Highway 77
(18 miles north of Ft Worth, Texas)

c. Observers: 2 Women, 1 man in car.

d. Description: Object appeared the size of a large dinner plate, Bright Silver Light, initially sighted about 35° due east, 2 miles over open country, object traveled south, object was in sight 3 minutes, object turned and climbed like a top, object appeared to cover 60° in approximately 90 seconds object just seemed to fade out of sight.

e. Action taken: Telephone check was made with Post Field Airdrome, and records were checked from Carswell Flight Service, Fort Worth, Texas with negative results.

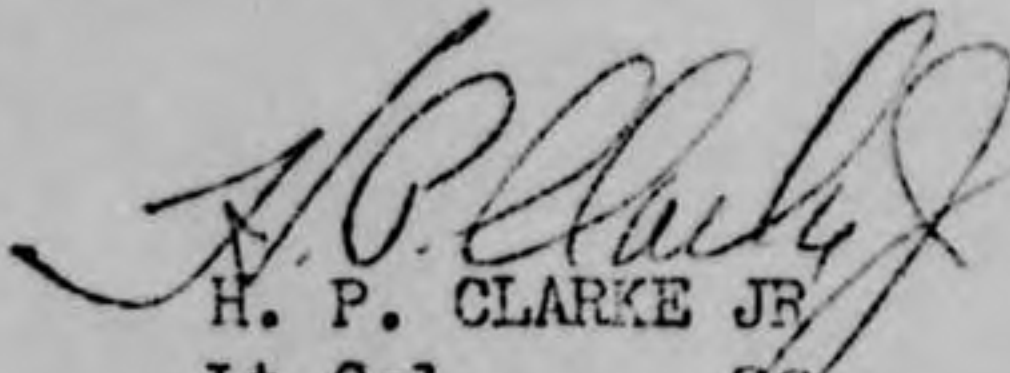

1. Reference letter your Headquarters, AG350.09 AKADB-I, dated 2 February 1951, Subject: Intelligence Activities.

2. In compliance with par 6a(5), above referenced letter, the following report concerning sighting of unidentified aerial object is forwarded for your information:

- a. Date and Time Observed: 1618 hours, 26 October 1952.
- b. Location: 2 miles south of Roanoke, Texas on Highway 77.
(18 miles north Ft. Worth, Texas)
- c. Observers: Driver's wife pointed out object and asked what it was.
- d. Description: When first observed, object appeared cigar shaped and about $\frac{2}{3}$ width of moon, very brilliant blue reflection, initially sighted about 30° above horizon, object was observed 90° from north, object appeared to be 3 miles from observer, object traveled straight up then went southerly losing some altitude then moving south east, object was in sight for 3 minutes, object appeared to cover a 60° in approximately 1 minute and 20 seconds, object went out of sight to the South East.
- e. Action taken: Telephone check was made with Post Field Airdrome, and records were checked from Carswell Flight Service, Fort Worth, Texas with negative results.
