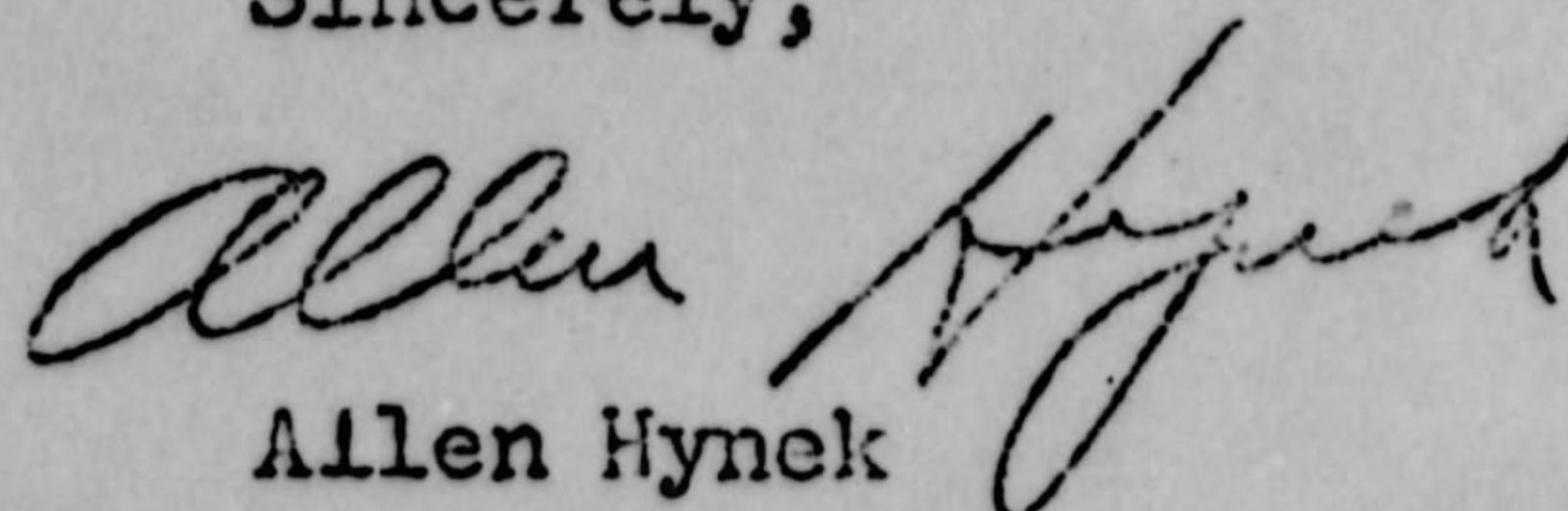

THROUGH CHANNELS:

1. In compliance with the provisions of AFL 200-5 dated 29 April 1952 the following report is submitted as a result of information reported to this headquarters by AFROTC Cadet Robert E. Alvey of this unit.

a. Cadet Alvey reported seeing one large bright object, white or light yellow, round in shape and larger than a star, move from a high westerly position in a falling arc toward the north, then level off and proceed at high speed in a straight line north, disappearing over the horizon. The object, though bright, cast no beam nor left any trail or exhaust. No sound was heard to indicate method of propulsion. The cadet was unable to reliably estimate speed or distance of the object since he did not know the size thereof. He indicated that the object appeared to fall free for a short time then level off and increase speed in level flight. *Not a meteor apparently*

b. The time of sighting was approximately 2310 Eastern Standard Time on 10 June 1953 and the estimated time in view was one minute. *6 seconds.*

c. This was a visual observation with no optical or electronic equipment available.

d. The location of the observer was approximately 83 degrees 17 minutes west and 42 degrees 25 minutes north. Specifically, the cadet was on the northwest corner of the intersection of Redford Avenue and Grand River Blvd. in Detroit, Michigan. The object was sighted at a position to the west of the observer and disappeared northward. Distance and altitude could not be estimated. *2310 EST +5 = 2310 2400 0410 Z (too late for a fallow)*

e. Cadet Robert E. Alvey is an AFROTC Cadet in his third year of training. He is physically qualified for and has planned for several years to enter pilot training. His interest in flying makes him observant of all visible flying aircraft. It is believed that this is a report of something he could not relate to his past observations, experience or his knowledge.

f. The weather at the time of sighting was clear, visibility was generally 10 miles or better and winds aloft were from approximately 300 degrees varying with altitude between 10 and 62 knots.

g. The only known traffic during the time of the sighting was one commercial DC-6 enroute from Chicago to Willow Run Airport in Detroit.

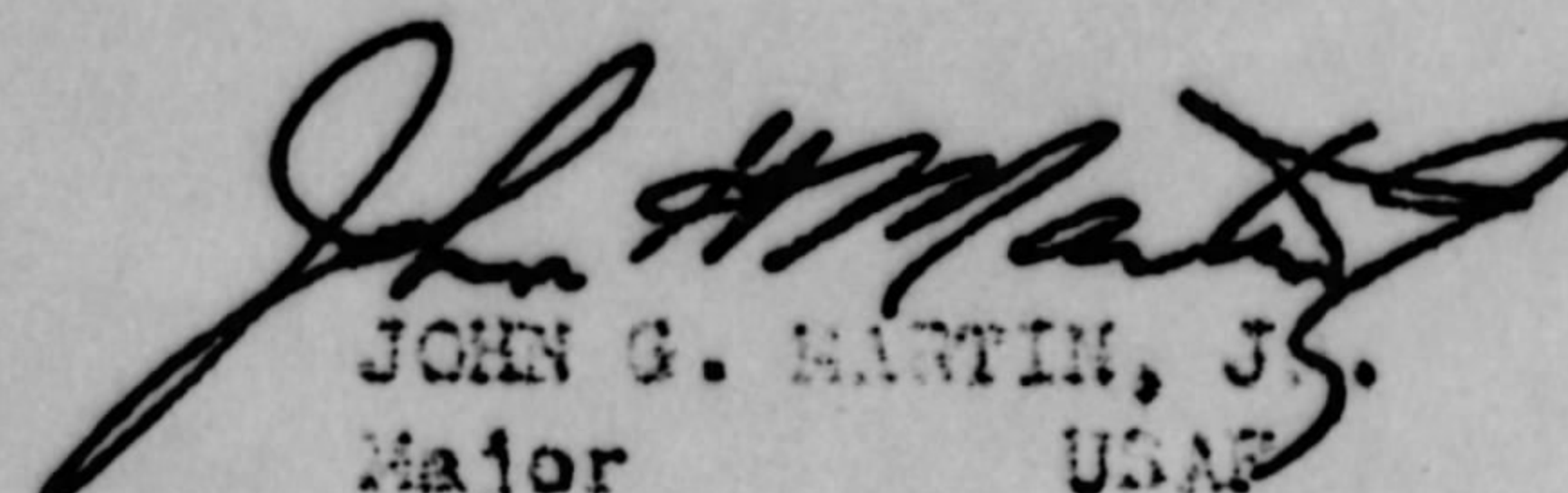

2. On 11 June 1953 Cadet Robert E. Alvey reported to the undersigned that he had observed, on 10 June 1953 at 2310 EST, a bright object which he could not identify moving at a fairly high rate of speed. The object first appeared to be falling then it leveled off and disappeared over the horizon. No sound was heard though the night was clear and there was little noise from his immediate area.

STATEMENT

McMillan Obs.:

Reference was sent to you week Wednesday of 15 June
'53 in this sighting. Here is a statement of the observer. After
comment: doesn't seem to be a meteor (level flight) or balloon (04102)

I had just left the Redford Theater and was cutting across
a parking lot at the northwest corner of Grand River and Redford
Avenue. I was admiring how clear the sky was and how well the stars
shone when I spotted this object. At first I thought it was a
meteor, but it didn't take me long to realize that it wasn't, meteors
just don't act like this object did. When I first sighted the object,
it was northwest of me. It appeared to be about five times the size
of a large star and just as bright. The light was white or light
yellow and of constant intensity. It did not flicker like stars do.
The time was within a few minutes of 2310 hours.

The object also fell too slow to be a meteor. I would
judge the speed to be somewhere under 1000 m.p.h. The object was
clear and distinct and round or elliptical in shape. It seemed to
fall free at first, but then it changed course, leveled out and
headed due north. I would judge that I watched for almost a minute
before it disappeared over the horizon. The sky was perfectly clear
and the air cool, sound would have travelled good, but there was
none except the few cars on Grand River a block away.

Regarding the Detroit 11 June case is there anything in this that a good landing light would not explain? Likewise Goodse AFB 11 June it would appear that since second radar did not pick up the signal, the most probable explanation is faulty radar. I assume that the GCI had radar available.

And we still have Venus with us. The 9 June Oregon case is clearly and unequivocally Venus.

Jennie has called to my attention the fact that I asked some follow-up questions which by now you may have obtained the answers.

Description

At 2310 EST on 10 June 1953 an AFROTC cadet at Wayne University observed one large bright object that was white or light yellow in color, round in shape and larger than a star. This object moved from a high westerly position in a falling arc toward the north and then leveled off and proceeded at a high rate of speed to the north in a straight line. This object made these maneuvers in a period of 60 seconds and disappeared over the northern horizon. The object, though bright, cast no beam nor left any trail or exhaust. No sound was noticed.

Discussion

Movements of this object and length of observation eliminate the possibility that it was of astronomical origin. Checks with airports in the vicinity revealed that there was one aircraft in the area. This was a DC-4 enroute to Chicago on a heading of 270 deg and was probably not in the area. A check was made with the weather bureau to determine whether or not they had a balloon in the area. A balloon was released at 0300Z, but it could not have caused the sighting since it burst before 0410Z (time of sighting).
