The following information was obtained by long distance telephone from 1st Lt [REDACTED] 47th Communication Squadron (C), Fort Air Force Base, Colorado Springs, Colorado. At time of sighting Lt [REDACTED] was at Cordell Hall, Oklahoma A & M Campus, Stillwater, Oklahoma, where he will remain until 23 July 1953.

1. As close as I could say it was elliptical; a dim white light compared with a ceiling light or the light a search light would throw on the bottom of a cloud. It was moving. It is possible that it could have been a search light; however, it moved back and forth in a limited arc. As far as I could tell, there was no overcast. As far as I know, the only thing that would throw up a light like that is the airport at Tulsa, Okla., approximately 70 miles away. The most objects I saw were two (2), one of which was intermittent. One was directly above the other. There is a possibility of a trail. The uppermost light seemed to disappear occasionally. There was a very limited range of movement, I would say a 10° arc. I heard no noise. If these objects were at the distance I think they were, the movement would have been quite rapid, I would say somewhere between 5 and 750 mph. This is based on what I have observed from aircraft. I left the objects to make the call to report them; when I went back they were not there. From time to time I saw stars above the object. I have never seen anything like this before.

2. I saw this object at approximately 2300 (CST) on 6 July 1953. I observed this for approximately two and one-half ($2\frac{1}{2}$) minutes.

3. I observed it from the ground with the naked eye.

4. I was outside on the ground at Cordell Hall, Oklahoma A & M Campus, Stillwater, Oklahoma. The object was about 15° or 20° from the horizon. It was about 120° North. The A & M Campus is located in the North Central part of Stillwater, Oklahoma.

5. I have two (2) years experience as Control Tower Operator with the Air Force. I am a private pilot and have a CAA Certificate as a control tower operator. I have approximately one hundred (100) hours in the air.

6. Further around towards North from 120° from East on up to about Northeast (about 45° to 90°) there was some lightening. It was off down to the horizon.

7. Meteorological condition is unknown.

8. I did not take any pictures and did not obtain any fragments.

9. There was no interception to my knowledge.

10. There was no aircraft in the air to the best of my knowledge.

The following information was obtained by long distance telephone from Mr. [REDACTED], Woodwell, Oklahoma, [REDACTED] Mr. [REDACTED] is temporarily residing at Cordell Hall, Oklahoma A & M Campus, Stillwater, Oklahoma.

1. What I saw looked like two (2) search light flashes that varied back and forth, one hitting right on top of the other. They would flash back and forth and then center on one. It looked like the beam came from the ground. You could see part of the beam at times and other times it would fade completely out. It was larger than a search light beam. I saw this two (2) or three (3) different nights. I just thought it was a search light. There are no search lights in this part of the country that I know of; however, I haven't spent much time here for the last five or six years. There was no sound. The color was the same as a search light beam. It looked like a search light beam reflecting off a cloud. I couldn't tell how many objects there were. When I saw these before, they were in the same locality. They looked like a search light crossing one another then all at once they would stop one on top of the other. I couldn't see any trail or exhaust. There was no propulsion that I know of. They moved rapidly. They moved a lot faster than an ordinary search light beam would have moved. They would start on one side of the horizon and move to the other. They would start just like a beam would and move across the sky until they reached the same place and stop on top of one another. I didn't see them disappear.

2. I saw this at approximately 2500 (CST) on 6 July 1953.

3. I observed these with the naked eye.

4. I was watching through the second (2d) story of the dormitory. There was a screen on the window and the window was open. The object was in the direction of Southeast of the dormitory, almost to a right angle - 85° to 90°.

5. I have had no experience observing aircraft. I was in the ground forces of the service for thirty-three (33) months.

6. On this particular night it was cloudy; the overcast was more or less in the background of the object I was watching. The cloudiness was Southeast of me.

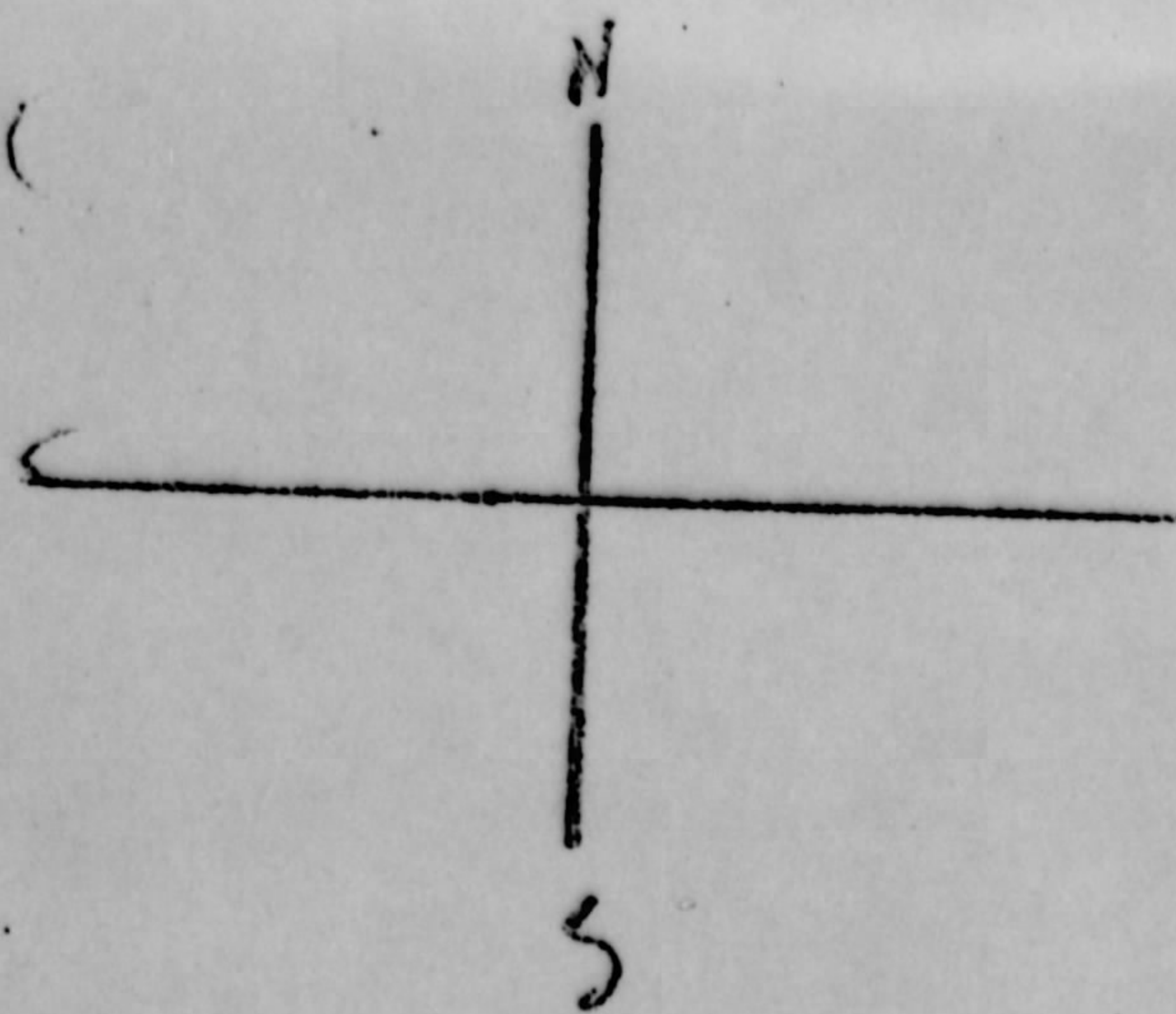
7. I don't know anything about meteorology.

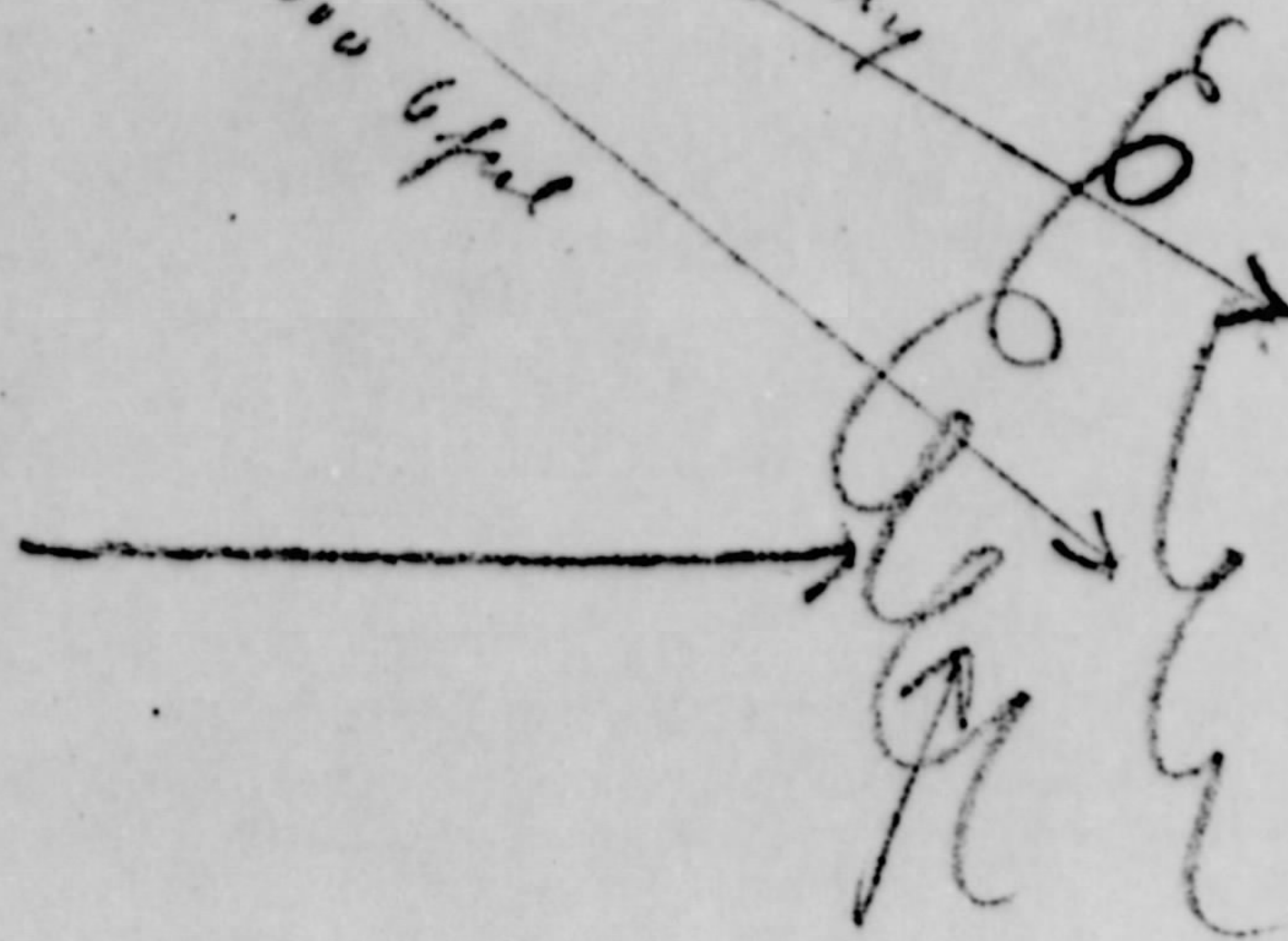

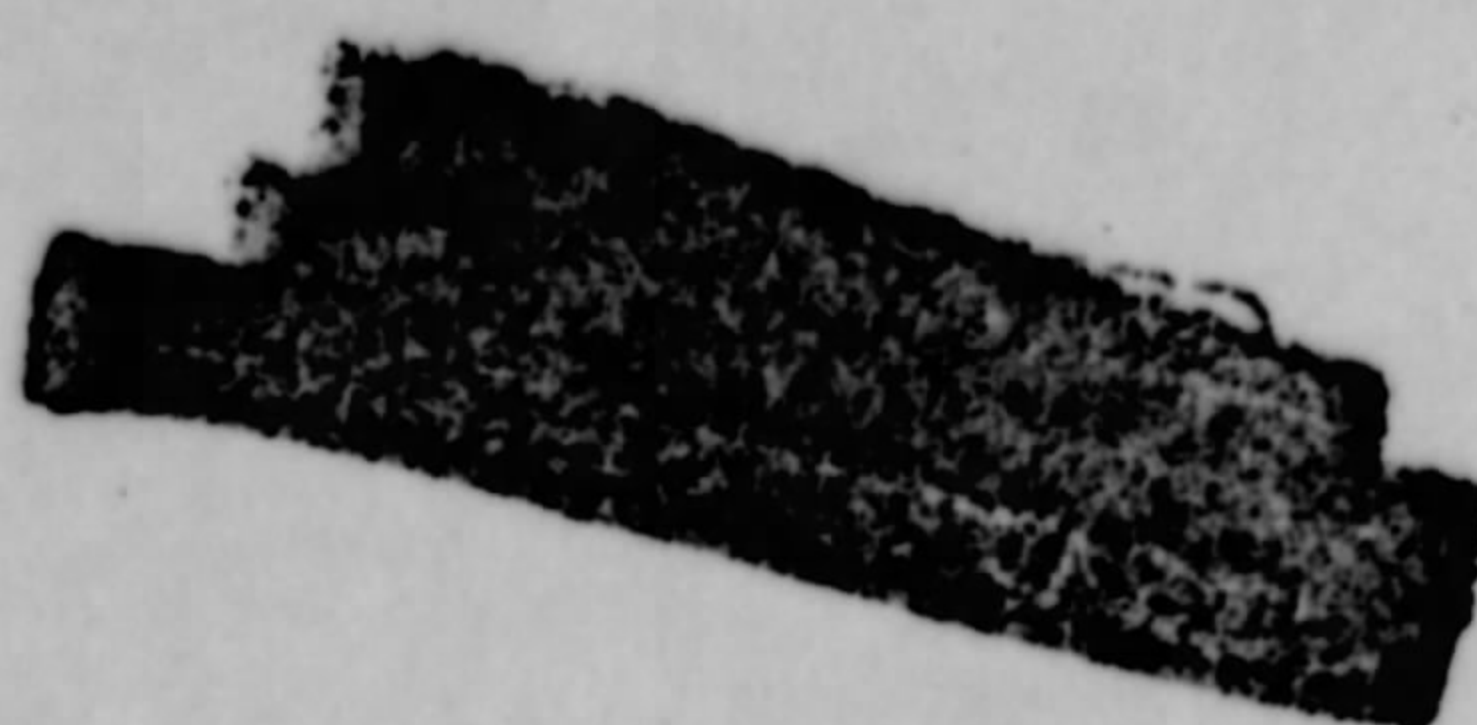

SYNOPSIS

On 8 July 1953, information was received from Special Agent AUBREY S. MURPHY, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Atlanta, Georgia, that three men, later identified as [REDACTED], [REDACTED], and [REDACTED], had seen an unknown flying object near Atlanta, Georgia. The three men were in possession of a dead animal, resembling a member of the monkey family, which they alleged to have been similar to two other animals which escaped in the unknown flying object. The dead animal was later proved to be a monkey, and [REDACTED] confessed to Cobb County Police Chief JOHN LEE that the entire story was a hoax. [REDACTED] was fined \$40.00 on the charge of obstructing the highway and was released at that time.

DETAILS:

1. This investigation was predicated upon information received telephonically from Special Agent AUBREY S. BRENT, Atlanta Field Office, Federal Bureau of Investigation, to the effect that three men had seen an unknown flying object near Atlanta, Georgia, the night of 7-8 July 1953.

AT ATLANTA, GEORGIA

2. The following portion of the investigation was conducted by Special Agent JAMES W. WARD.

3. At 0855 hours on 8 July 1953, Special Agent AUBREY S. BRENT, Atlanta Field Office, Federal Bureau of Investigation, telephonically contacted the Atlanta Detachment, 6th District OSI (IG), and advised Special Agent JAMES W. WARD of a telephone call received by the FBI night agent at 0345 hours, 8 July 1953. In this call, Mr. THOMAS McRAE of the Atlanta Constitution informed the FBI of the following information given McRAE by [REDACTED] of [REDACTED] N. E., Atlanta. [REDACTED] had told McRAE that he (W[REDACTED]) and two (2) companions were driving on the Bankhead Highway (U. S. Highway 78) near Mableton, Georgia, when they saw three (3) animals on the highway. [REDACTED] said that two of the animals went to an object, which he described as a flying object, and took off in the object, which immediately disappeared. [REDACTED] further stated that his car hit the third animal, killing it. McRAE told the FBI that [REDACTED] brought the dead animal to the Atlanta Constitution (10 Forsyth Building, Atlanta, Georgia), where McRAE examined it. McRAE described the animal as resembling a member of the monkey family, approximately twenty-one (21) inches in length, with long ears, and pink coloring, but having neither hair nor tail. McRAE advised that a local veterinarian (unidentified) examined the animal and stated that he had never seen such an animal before. In his call to OSI, Special Agent BRENT (FBI) noted McRAE's emphatic statement that none of the Atlanta Constitution staff were drunk in making the claims. No further information had been given to the FBI, according to BRENT.

4. At 1000 hours on 8 July 1953, Special Agent JAMES W. WARD briefly interviewed [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] N. E., concerning his allegation of seeing the flying object. [REDACTED] advised that he and his two companions had just driven over a hill on the Bankhead Highway when they saw a bright red glow moving in front of the car. [REDACTED] stated that they saw three (3) animals jump for the moving red object and that two got on the object and disappeared with it. [REDACTED] advised that their car hit the third animal, however, killing the animal. [REDACTED] identified his companions as a [REDACTED], "who works at the Big Apple Store, Brookhaven, Georgia, and a person [REDACTED] identified only as [REDACTED]". No further questions were asked [REDACTED] because of the intrusion of reporters from the Atlanta Journal who sought to interview [REDACTED] concerning the incident.

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DETAILS (contd)

5. At approximately 1100 hours, 8 July 1953, the following authorities at Dobbins Air Force Base, Georgia, were telephonically advised of the incident: Captain J. P. BORDEN, Base Operations Officer, Dobbins Air Force Base, and A/1C HUGH SUMMER, Intelligence Section, 35th Air Division, Dobbins Air Force Base. (A/1C SUMMER took the information for Captain HENRY G. SANDERS, Director of Intelligence, 35th Air Division, who was temporarily out of the office.)

6. At 1615 hours, 8 July 1953, Captain SANDERS was telephonically contacted at the Intelligence Section, 35th Air Division, Dobbins AFB. SANDERS advised that he had interviewed [REDACTED] and had seen the animal in question. Captain SANDERS advised that the animal had been taken to the Emory University Hospital, where an Emory authority (name or position not given) identified it as a member of the monkey family and not an "animal from space." Captain SANDERS further advised that he was initiating a TWX message to Headquarters USAF and to the Air Technical Intelligence Center, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, advising that he (SANDERS) believed the entire incident was a hoax. SANDERS further advised that pictures of the animal were taken, and that a complete "Flying Object Report" would be submitted within two days. Captain SANDERS advised that an information copy of the aforementioned TWX would be furnished to the Directorate of Special Investigations, as well as an information copy of the completed report.

7. The Atlanta Constitution, Atlanta, Georgia, dated 9 July 1953, page twelve (12), contained an article which identified the dead animal as a monkey which had been shaved and from which the tail had been removed. This conclusion was reached by Dr. HERMAN JONES of the State Crime Laboratory and Dr. MARION HINES, professor of experimental anatomy at Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia.

8. The Atlanta Journal, Atlanta, Georgia, dated 9 July 1953, pages one (1) and four (4), contained an article which stated that [REDACTED] had confessed to Dobb County Police Chief JOHN LEE that the story was a hoax. [REDACTED] explained that the story was developed as a result of a \$10.00 bet with a friend that he ([REDACTED]) could not get his picture in the paper. [REDACTED] was fined \$40.00 for obstructing the highway and released at that time.
