Appeared to be stationary, then moved in direct flight over the horizon to the SE in about 1 min. Oval possibly, no details, no tail. Had a whip motion, disappearance was behind trees on hill.				11. COMMENTS Observer located object in vicinity of sun, then followed object to point behind trees on hill, description including circumstance of sighting in location near sun indicates that the witness probably saw reflection from the a/c that he was attempting to locate, however, could not distinguish features of this a/c due to the briefness of the sighting.

SIGHTING OF UNUSUAL AERIAL OBJECT

Mr. J.M. COWDEN

BLACKBURN - 3rd January 1954

1. Herewith report of a sighting by Mr. [REDACTED] of Blackburn of an unusual aerial object 1555 hours 3rd January 1954.
2. Four other observers have reported to Department of Civil Aviation sighting similar objects at about the same time on 3rd January 1954 but it has not been possible to correlate these sightings as yet.
3. Mr. [REDACTED] report was made to the Air Operations Room AFHQ only immediately after the sighting. The writer visited Mr. [REDACTED] after work on 8th January 1954 and obtained the attached report. Mrs. [REDACTED], who was beside her husband at the time of sighting, saw nothing. Mr. [REDACTED] appeared quite genuine and had no previous interest in "flying saucers" or other aerial phenomena. In fact he objected to the term "flying saucer" as applied to his sighting and regrets having mentioned his sighting because of subsequent ridicule from his neighbours.
