The following is a translation in full of two letters addressed in Spanish to "Institute of Scientific Investigation, Washington, D.C." from "... Coahuila, Mexico." The envelope bears a Mexican postage stamp, but the postmark is illegible.

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Letter #1.

The Director of Scientific Investigations:

My attention being distracted for a moment on March 5, 1954, between 9:30 and 10 at night, I went into the courtyard of my house. I am in the habit of watching the sky. Suddenly I saw a blue object and later it produced a white gleam of light and I thought that it was a rocket of colored lights (instead of "rocket" the writer may have meant "meteor"), but when I saw that it did not fall, I went upstairs and observed it. I noticed that as it departed it became smaller up to the point of becoming confused with the stars. I remained there about three minutes watching it, but the curious thing for me was that it glided away with an accelerating speed and when it was almost in front of me, it kept on moving toward the south. If you were to place yourself so that your back was to the north, you would have found that it traveled from left to right producing a very perceptible screech, which I heard very well, and for another three minutes or so I watched it as it traveled in a southward direction.
