On 17 March 1954, at 0112Z, the following report was received from G.O.C., Detachment 2, Chicago, Illinois:

A round object, resembling a silver fire ball, was visually sighted, approximately at CM 0853 in the vicinity of Oak Park, Illinois. Object was traveling North at a very high rate of speed. No actual altitude was given, but object was estimated to be at a very high altitude, disappearing shortly after being sighted. Object was sighted at 0030Z.

The weather conditions at 0030Z were as follows: Sky Conditions; 250, Scattered; Visibility; 7 miles; Temperature; 44°; Dew Point; 20; Winds were West Northwest at 6 knots.

Radar at the 755th AC&W Squadron, Williams Bay, Wisconsin was unable to pick up the object. Interception or identification action was not taken.
