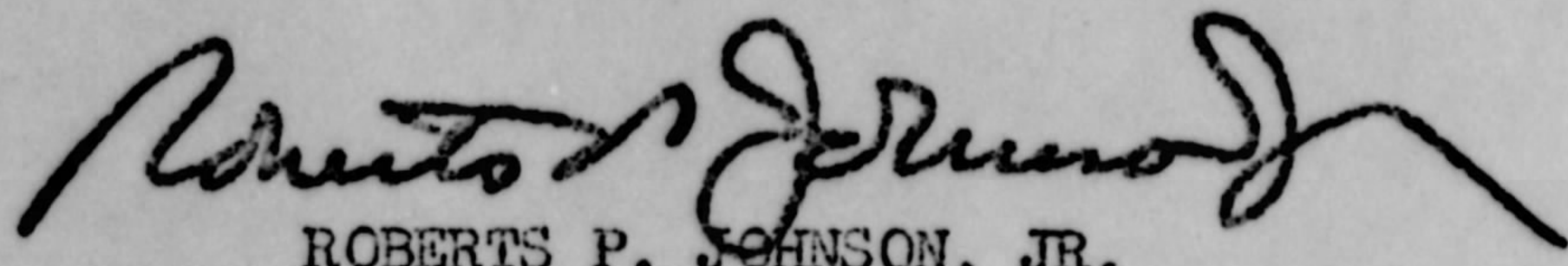

SYNOPSIS

Investigation requested by the Commander, Keesler AFB, Miss., after resident of Bay St. Louis, Miss., reported seeing unidentified flying objects 19 May 54. Fishing camp operator, reported that at about 2030 hours, he saw three reddish glowing objects over bay; that objects bobbed and weaved, moving gradually out of sight and made no sound. Mrs. [redacted] also reported seeing objects. [redacted] stated [redacted] brought her attention to object which she observed for several minutes, but that she saw only one.

DETAILS:

1. This investigation was requested by the Commander, Keesler Air Force Base, Mississippi, orally, through Colonel John C. HARRIS, Wing 1/C on 20 May 1964, and predicated on information furnished by Keesler Detachment 8th District OMI (ID), Keesler Air Force Base, Mississippi.

2. Special Agent LOUIS H. CORNWALL assisted in this investigation.

AT KEESLER AIR FORCE BASE, MISSISSIPPI

3. At 0921 hours 20 May 1964, Special Agent CORNWALL received a telephone call from Special Agent RICHARD V. TINKER, New Orleans Detachment, 8th District OMI (ID), New Orleans, Louisiana, in which Special Agent TINKER related that at 0800 hours 20 May 1964 he received information from Mr. [redacted] Special Agent, FBI, New Orleans, Louisiana, concerning a report of an unidentified flying object. Mr. TINKER informed Special Agent CORNWALL that Mr. [redacted] had telephonically informed him that at approximately 2000 hours 19 May 1964, he had observed three large objects which appeared to be large balls of fire flying in a weaving and bobbing manner at a low altitude over the water near [redacted] Bay, Mississippi. [redacted] further reported that the objects made a loud humming sound and were definitely not conventional aircraft; that he observed these objects for approximately 20 minutes before calling the FBI and they were still visible during his conversation with the FBI in New Orleans; that he knew the objects were not conventional aircraft and that the light from the objects was plainly reflected in the water of the bay, and other persons beside himself had seen the objects. [redacted] related that he was a veteran of the Air Force and was familiar with all types of conventional aircraft but had never seen anything similar to this before.

AT BAY ST. LOUIS, MISSISSIPPI

4. On 20 May 1964, Mr. [redacted] North Beach, Bay St. Louis, Mississippi, stated that he operates a fishing camp at the mouth of the Jordan River on Bay St. Louis; that he has been in Bay St. Louis a relatively short time and formerly resided in New Orleans, Louisiana. Mr. [redacted] described the incident concerning the unidentified flying objects as follows:

- a. Shape: Appeared to be stars but had a reddish-yellow glow.
- b. Size: Appeared to be about twice as large as other stars.
- c. Color: Reddish-yellow hue.

d. Number: Three

e. Formation: Two of the objects appeared to be 6-8 feet apart from the observation point and the third object appeared to be 15-20 feet from the first two.

f. Discernible features: None

g. Tail trail or exhaust: None

h. Sound: None

i. Other pertinent or unusual features: None

Mr. [redacted] stated that at approximately 2000 hours 12 May 1954, he went out to the pier to check the water and sky and noticed two objects reflected in the water; that the two objects appeared to be similar to the light from the objects shining down on the water; that he followed these rays up from the water until he saw the objects in the sky; that he then noticed a third object in the sky which was a considerable distance away from the other two; that he observed these objects for approximately forty-five minutes; that he would estimate the objects were approximately 5000' above the horizon and were in a northeasterly direction from the point of observation; that the three objects moved in an up and down and side to side pattern but did not seem to have any regular pattern; that the objects were in uniform; that the objects seemed to fade away in a northeasterly direction as if they were going away from the observer until they finally disappeared; that he could not estimate the altitude or distance of the objects except they appeared to be a great distance from him. Mr. [redacted] stated that the sky was clear and visibility was unrestricted.

Mr. [redacted] stated that his wife and a Mr. [redacted] had also observed these objects.

5. On 21 May 1954, Mrs. [redacted] gave substantially the same information concerning the unidentified objects as related by her husband. Mrs. [redacted] stated that at the time she observed the objects the water in the bay was calm.

6. On 21 May 1954, Mrs. [redacted] of St. Louis, Mississippi, stated substantially the same as Mrs. [redacted] except that she reported seeing only one object. Mrs. [redacted] stated that she drove up to Mr. [redacted]'s fishing camp and Mr. [redacted] and Mrs. [redacted] were out on the pier; that they pointed the object out to her and she observed it for approximately 15 minutes. Mrs. [redacted] further related that she noticed that the moon appeared to be very red that night.

7. Due to the short time [redacted] has resided in [redacted] Mississippi, no one could be located who could establish reputation and credibility of [redacted]

AT HESSIAH AFB FORCE BASE, MISSISSIPPI

8. On 22 May 1954 the writer briefed Captain NORMAN G. BAUSER, 10 547230, Wing Training Officer, with all the available information concerning the unidentified flying objects referred to above.

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
