In compliance with AFR 200-2, dated 26 August 1953, the following report is submitted:

 - (a) Shape - Elliptical.
 - (b) Size compared to known object - pea held in the hand at about arm's length.
 - (c) Color - Varied. At first it was an intense white light, later turned to a pure yellow, then to orange, then to pink, and finally a dark pink.
 - (d) Number - One.
 - (e) Formation - N/A.
 - (f) No discernible features or details noted.
 - (g) No tail, trail, or exhaust noted.
 - (h) No sound heard.
 - (i) During the time object was observed (approximately 5 minutes), it went through four or five cycles of growing in intensity until a peak was reached, and then subsiding to a dull color. When first observed, the object gave off an intense white light which changed to a yellow and then to pink and finally, just before it disappeared, to a dark pink. Object's manner of disappearance led observer to feel that the object had consumed itself.
- (2) Description of course of object:
 - (a) Observer was driving to his home in his automobile when the unusual brilliance of the object first called his attention to the object.
 - (b) Angle of elevation and azimuth of the object when first observed was about forty-five degrees.
 - (c) Angle of elevation of object upon disappearance was about forty-five degrees (object traveled about fifteen degrees laterally).

The object was sighted while the observer was riding in an automobile toward San Antonio, Texas, on the Gonzales Road approximately ten (10) miles out from the city. The object sighted was approximately nine (9) feet in diameter or possibly larger. It was constructed of some shiny metal, like aluminum, so bright "it would put your eyes out." The object was in view for about three (3) minutes and moved in the direction of Lackland Air Force Base. It moved at a very high rate of speed and was lost from view in the clouds. The observer estimates the time of the sighting to be 1030 hours, 8 August 1954. The observer was riding in a car with a male companion who did not see the object as he did not wish to take his eyes off the road. The observer stated that she saw a similar object over Phoenix, Arizona in 1950. This object remained in sight long enough for her to hang out a complete line of washing. Since then she has always watched the sky for similar objects. The observer is an apartment house owner and operator about fifty (50) years of age. A similar sighting was reported on the news over radio station KONO, San Antonio, Texas, on the evening of 8 August 1954. The first object was sighted by the sources wife while at his residence at [REDACTED], San Antonio, Texas. The sources wife was in bed and noticed the object in the sky through the window. The object remained in view for approximately 25 seconds. It appeared as a bright almost white light which turned into an almost red light before the object diminished. Sources wife called for him to come into the room but by the time source arrived, the object had disappeared. Source and his wife continued to watch the sky and approximately ten (10) minutes later a similiar object appeared in approximately the same position as the first. The characteristics of the second object were the same as the first. It passed through a 70 to 75 degree arc in 15 seconds, appearing from the north east and traveling to the south west. The source is an Intelligence Instructor with the USAF Pre-Flight School at this station. While stationed at White Sands, New Mexico, he had heard numerous stories about "Flying Saucers".

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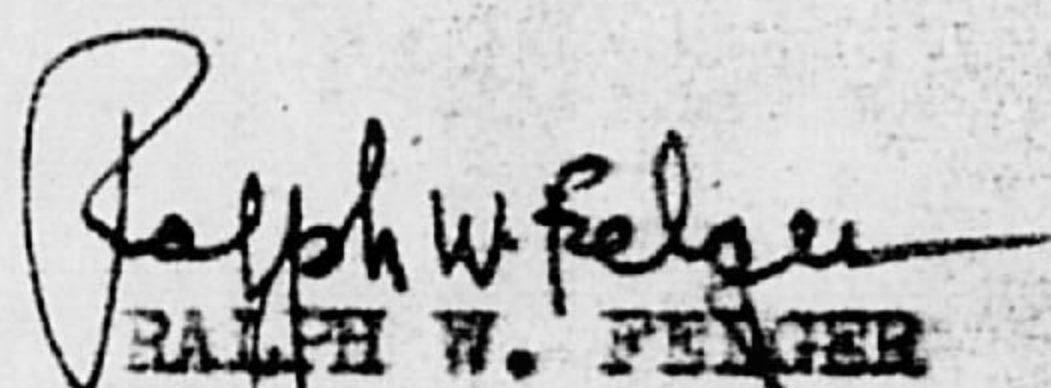

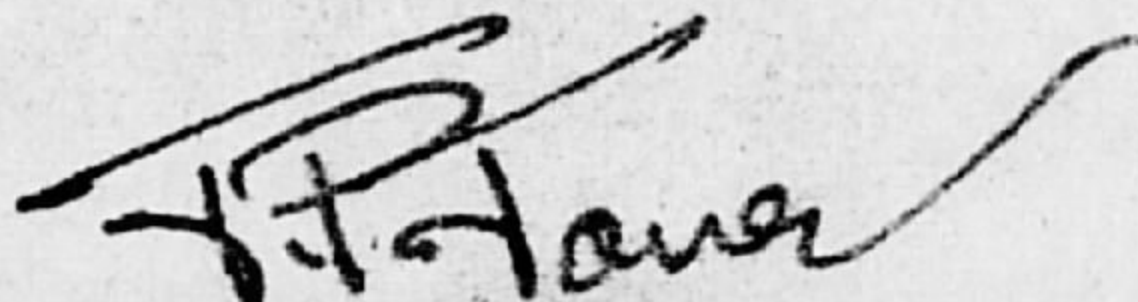

Local Man Sees Mysterious Object In Nighttime Skies Over This Area

"It had a reddish tinge and was about the color of the planet Mars," said Frank Saunders in describing a mysterious object which he saw in local skies at 8:24 p. m. Tuesday.

Saunders, who lives at Roanoke Motor Court, said the object did not blink nor did it make a sound that he could hear.

"It was faster than an airplane, but slower than any meteor I've ever seen," Saunders told Radio Station WCBT's news department shortly after the occurrence.

He said he spotted it in the East, that it moved from East to West past the zenith, then turned South to about what he called "11 o'clock", then West again and he lost sight of it. He had it under observation for about two minutes.

He said that as he observed it, it moved "about one inch per second" in his visibility.
