1. Inclosed is UFOB Report transmitted to this Squadron by Hq, 26th AD (Defense).

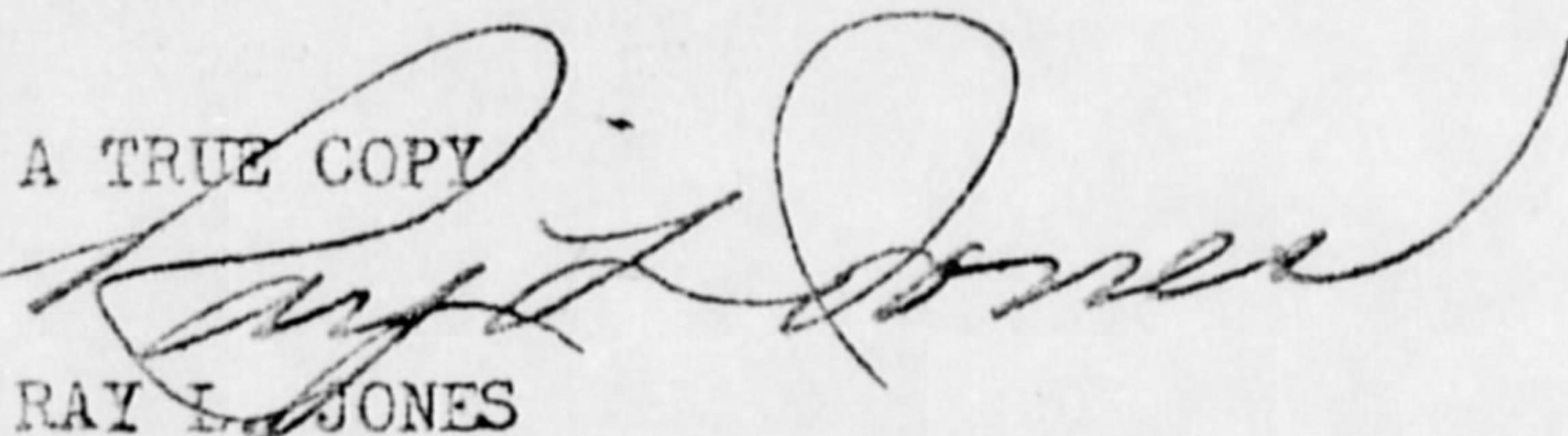
2. This Squadron concurs in the hypothesis of the Preparing Officer that the sighting was possibly caused by search light activity. There have already been other reports from this same vicinity caused by similar phenomena (see, e.g., sighting of 4 and 5 March, sources: ~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ place: New York City). Due to the improbability at this time of gaining much more information, there will be no further investigation in this matter.

New York CAA reports that it would be very difficult to state the exact number, due to the time lapse since the report and also because CAA does not have records of many of the flights in the area. 11. GEORGE J. HALEY, Captain, USAF, Director of Intelligence, 26th Air Division (Def) Roslyn AFS, Roslyn, N.Y. The Manhattan, Brooklyn and Long Island areas have been very active with power search light operation. Search light beams reflecting from the smoke or haze layer or from low cloud decks and with otherwise good night visibility, lend impetus to observation of unknown air activity. A search light orbit is apt to appear as though suddenly reversed (in direction) (Ref para 2) and lack of a reflecting cloud surface would make the object disappear. I have no doubt the objects observed were both the result of search light activity and the reflection on under surfaces of low hanging clouds. 12. Negative.
