II. RELIABILITY: Contact was made with an official of the Michigan Conservation Department, who for obvious reasons prefers to remain anonymous. This person has known the SOURCE for several years and stated that the SOURCE'S credibility is very questionable because he has been known to tell some very wild stories concerning "Flying Saucers". Therefore, taking into his past history concerning "out of the ordinary" observations and "very unusual" experiences, the SOURCE'S reliability must be considered as very questionable.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: On 25 April 1955 at approximately 2240 hrs (260340Z), while returning home from work, SOURCE claims to have made the observation as he was entering his cottage in Rosecommon, Michigan (GPR 2430). The following statement was given by the SOURCE in a telephone conversation on 28 April with an AISS Flight 3-6 Investigating Officer. "As I entered the door of my cottage my eyes were attracted to an unusually bright object moving in the sky that was at least 4 times larger and brighter than any star in the area. I glanced at my watch and noticed that it was about twenty minutes to eleven. I don't know how high it was, but I do know that it must have been among the clouds because I could see them 'light up' as it went through them. I watched it for about ten minutes and then it gradually began to lose its brightness until it had completely disappeared". When the SOURCE was asked if the object had any particular shape, or moved in any certain direction or speed, he said that "it just looked like a ball and it had a very irregular course, although I don't know how fast it was going. I'm sure it was faster than any jet airplane that I've ever seen". When the SOURCE was told that he might have to be contacted again for further information, he said "Gosh Lieutenant, I'm afraid I have a very vivid imagination because I'm sure I've seen things like that before".

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SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE REPORTS:

1. Contact was made with Col. Brownell, 30th Air Division D/T, who informed Investigating Officer that he had not received notification of the UR03 call.

2. Col. Brownell called the 752d AGW Sqdn. at Empire, Michigan (code 5608) where the message originated, and was informed that the 752d had no record of the UR03 call. It was later disclosed that an airman, who has not been briefed on UR03 procedures, notified 46020 AISS Headquarters by teletype message and then failed to record it.

3. A check with the Wright-Patterson Flight Service Center was made by Flight 3-8, 46020 AISS, for aircraft in the area at the time of sighting. Negative results.

4. The 661st AGW Sqdn. at Selfridge AFB, Michigan, and the 752d AGW Sqdn. at Empire, Michigan reported no unusual readings or occurrences at the time of the alleged UR03 sighting.

5. A check with the Selfridge AFB Weather Station revealed no significant meteorological data which could be related to the UR03 sighting.
