STATEMENT BY CAPTAIN DANIEL

I was the Aerial Weather Reconnaissance Officer on the night of 1 November 1956 in a T-33 aircraft going from Springfield, Illinois to Eglin Air Force Base on a true course of 140°. After reaching an altitude at 35,000 feet, a steady orange light with a blue tinge was sighted near Mount Vernon at about 2330Z at about a 5° elevation angle and 220° from the aircraft. I was unable to judge the distance, speed, or size of the object. There was no tail, or exhaust discernible. It did not appear to be a jet exhaust as the light intensity was constant when viewed from a changing direction. I do not believe it was a meteor as there was not any tail, nor another aircraft because of the lack of blinking navigation lights. The object was in view for about two minutes, increasing nearly 5° in elevation and to about 320° from the aircraft position. As the aircraft was heading in opposite direction from the object, I was unable to view it any longer. The night was clear, with an unlimited ceiling and unrestricted visibility of at least 60 miles. The cloud formation in the area was thin altostratus on the East and Southeast horizon and clear in the vicinity of the object. I am unable to give a logical explanation for this reported sighting.

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- (1) Description of the object:
 - (a) A round light
 - (b) The size of the light was about that of a F-94 A/B light when seen from a distance of 1 mile at night. However, there was no tail visible.
 - (c) A very light yellow
 - (d) One
 - (e) N/A
 - (f) N/A
 - (g) The object was round without any tail and looked like an exhaust.
 - (h) No sound heard
 - (i) N/A
- (2) (a) and (b) A light moved across the sky from about 10 o'clock a few degrees above the horizon to 12 o'clock about 35° above the horizon. It then continued around to 3 o'clock.
 - (c) The object disappeared in the distance about 10 degrees above the horizon with a magnetic course heading of approximately 280 degrees.
 - (d) The object appeared in a straight course with an estimated speed of more than 1200 knots.
 - (e) The object disappeared in the light and haze over St. Louis.
 - (f) Approximately one minute.
- (3) (a) Air-visual
 - (b) None
 - (c) The sighting was made from a T-33 aircraft, #074 while at an altitude of 35,000 feet, 165° heading, and proceeding at 400 knots to Eglin AFB, Florida from Springfield, Illinois.
- (4) (a) The sighting was made at 2330Z 1 November 1956.
 - (b) Night
- (5) The aircraft was located 60 miles east of St. Louis, Missouri.
- (6) The pilot was Lt Colonel Walter A. Rosenfield, Jr., and the Aerial Weather Reconnaissance Officer was Orville H. Daniel. Lt Col Rosenfield is the Chief, Maintenance Division, 3243rd Test Group (Fighter), AFOTC, Eglin AFB, Florida. He has over 10,000 flying hours, is current in supersonic aircraft, and is quite familiar with aircraft exhaust and afterburner appearances. Capt Daniel is assigned to Headquarters, APGC, Directorate of Test Requirements, Eglin AFB, Florida. He is an Air Force meteorologist and holds an AFSC of 2524 and 2534. Inclosure #1 contains a statement by Captain Daniel.
- (7) (a) CAVU
 - (b) Winds at 35,000' from 290° at 75 knots.
 - (c) Clear
 - (d) Unlimited

- (8) None
- (9) As the object crossed in front and above the aircraft, the pilot turned with it and attempted to keep it in sight. He followed it until it disappeared, and he states it definitely was not a meteor.

(11) The preparing officer is Captain William M. Lyons, Chief, Intelligence Division, APGC, Eglin AFB, Florida. In this particular report, the observer is a serious, conscientious, experienced pilot who was a bit reluctant in submitting this report.
