2. Attached as inclosures are copies of two letters from the Albany, New York, Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation dated 2 and 4 December 1957. The letter dated 2 December 1957 describes the sighting of unidentified flying object on 13 November 1957 between Oneida and Wampsville, New York, by a Mrs. [REDACTED], Wampsville, New York. The letter dated 4 December 1957, describes the sighting of an unidentified flying object on 3 December 1957 approximately eight (8) miles north of Saratoga, New York, by a Mr. [REDACTED], [REDACTED] Street, Lake George, New York.

4. This matter is being referred to your Headquarters in accordance with the referenced regulation. No investigation of this matter is contemplated by this District Office.

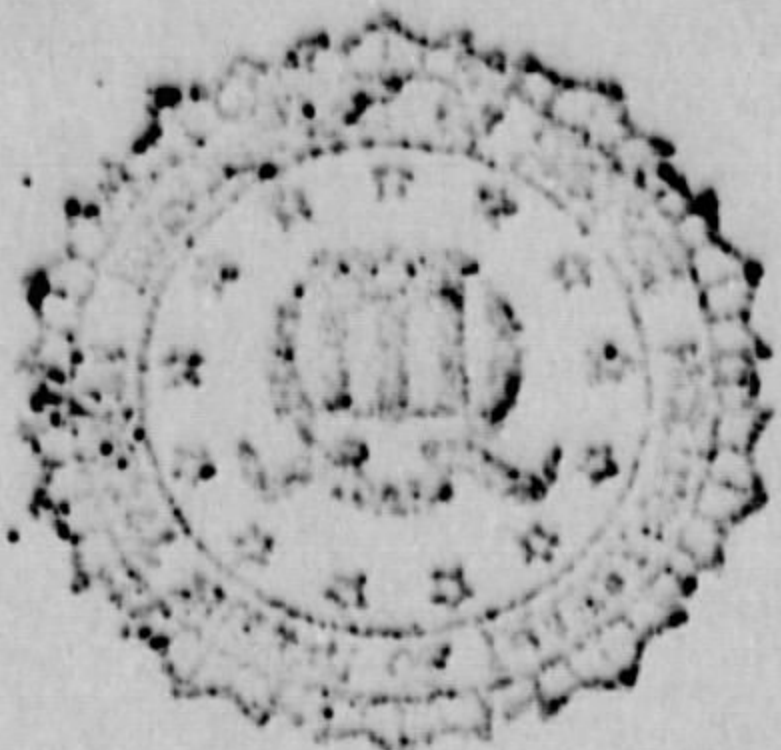

Dear Colonel Bugh:

This is to advise that at 7:40 p.m., on November 13, 1957, [REDACTED] telephonically contacted the Albany Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and advised Special Agent Edward M. Nally Jr., of this office, that he was an executive with the [REDACTED] Motor Company, Canastota, New York, and that his wife, while returning from Oneida, New York, to their residence in Wampsville, New York, advised him that she had seen a flying saucer.

He stated that his wife is a very level headed individual, had not been drinking, and that he had no reason to believe that she did not see the object she described as a flying saucer.

Mr. [REDACTED] put his wife on the telephone and she advised that at about 7:30 p.m., on November 13, 1957, while she was returning from Oneida to Wampsville, New York, she had seen in the distance a flying object which she described as the size of a dinner plate. She stated that she saw this object approximately two miles in the distance and that this object was moving up and down, and from the right to the left and from the left to the right.

She stated that this object was moving very fast. She advised that when she came closer to this object, it
