Summary

A Mr. [REDACTED], from Stat. Service Division, AHC contacted Sgt. Dolan, NCOIC, UFO Group. Stated he was contacted by a Mr. [REDACTED] who gave him a specimen of a flying object that fell sizzling out of the sky into a creek nearby his home. Requested that the government should examine it, and that he be contacted for the rest of the meteorite (as he called it) which weighed about 50 lbs.

According to [REDACTED] he broke a fragment off within 15 minutes after it hit the water.

Examination shows object to be iron pyrite-crystal fragments. Must have been in the water for some lengthy period. It did not fall from the sky as a meteorite, as the aerodynamic heating, melting and spalling would have scorched and rounded off the falling object. The crystals were sharp and square. Verbal report given to Mr. [REDACTED] with comment that [REDACTED] is unreliable. Fragment in specimen drawer under case file date.
